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

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

ICY PARADISE COMING TO LAKE GENEVA

Experience a new type of winter wonderland this season as you explore a 30,000-square-foot "ice castle" on Lake Geneva's Riviera Beach.

Officials expect the attraction to open in late December, and it will be a highlight of the city's Winterfest celebration Jan. 26 to Feb. 3.

"Considering Lake Geneva is the place to go for winter fun, this is just another asset that reinforces our legacy as a vacation destination," says Joe Tominaro, director of marketing and development for VISIT Lake Geneva.

The concept for Ice Castles was developed during the winter of 2010, when Brent Christensen returned to his native Utah and wanted his daughter to delight in the joys of winter. Christensen created his own version of a snow fort by running a hose over a swing set, which produced an ice cave. With a little ingenuity, he realized he could take it to another level.

Ice Castles LLC was established a year

later in Midway, Utah, and has emerged in four other locations: Lincoln, New Hampshire; Edmonton, Alberta; Dillon, Colorado; and Stillwater, Minnesota. Each location offers a one-of-a-kind experience comprised of thousands of icicles handplaced by professional ice artists.

Anywhere from 20 to 40 "ice artisans" are involved in the process, which requires using racks that resemble dog crates to develop what Ice Castles Marketing Director Rachel Kahler calls "icicle farms." She explains, "In essence, we're harvesting icicles. The process of growing them can range from 5,000 to 12,000 icicles per day," she adds.

According to Kahler, the intricately detailed structures each occupy about an acre and can reach heights of 20 to 30 feet. They can take about two months to construct and weigh more than 25 million pounds.

A self-proclaimed "ice junkie," Kahler says the company is looking forward to expanding to Lake Geneva. "It's always exciting to come into a new community," Kahler says. "We have been so welcomed by businesses. They're excited about us coming and bringing more visitors to the area." Christensen and a site manager started laying the foundation for Lake Geneva's Ice Castles in October, including setting up water lines and electricity so they can freeze color-changing LED lights into the castle walls.

Water volume, wind conditions and other weather factors determine the exact structural balance of each castle, but the design ultimately comes down to Christensen's vision, which is why no two structures are the same. The optimal lifespan of a castle, according to Kahler, is late December to early March.

Tickets will be sold according to arrival times, but once you enter the castle, there is no limit to your visit, says Kahler. Reserve a spot at icecastles.com/lake-geneva/.



Three of the four acts will be returning



NATIVE SON COOKING UP UNIQUE FARE

Miles Borghgraef first got a taste of the restaurant business as a dishwasher at the former Mia Bella Bistro, now the site of Lake Geneva's Sopra restaurant. Washing dishes gave him just enough of the food service industry's flavor to get hooked. "I fell in love with restaurants," the Lake Geneva native, says. "They made me feel at home."

Since then, he has bounced from job to job, working his way up in the industry and always looking for the next best thing. He thinks he might have found it with Birch





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and Butcher on Milwaukee's East Side.

Borghgraef, 33, the restaurant's head chef and owner, aims to change the narrative on restaurant dining. With Birch and Butcher, he looks to create a comfortable, Thanksgiving dinner-like atmosphere where guests can pass five to seven dishes around the table with family and friends.

"The vision for it is to make the most delicious food I can and not try to overcomplicate anything," he says.

That's the foundation on which he and his wife, Rebecca Zwiefelhofer, have built their restaurant, which opened in November 2017.

About 75 to 80 percent of the menu is cooked on an open-fire hearth, making it only one of about a dozen restaurants in the U.S. to use one, according to Borghgraef. "Flavors in the wood hearth are really familiar to everyone, whether you're barbecuing with family in your backyard or going camping," he says.

A lot of Borghgraef's success has come through trial and error, and although he never attended culinary school, he says, he received training from a number of chefs and business owners. "I want to continue to grow and get better and offer people and guests a unique dining experience, and hopefully combinations they've never tasted before," he says.

Patrick Quinn is seated inside Speedo's Harborside Pub & Grill in downtown Lake Geneva on a rainy Saturday morning. Just a few tables are occupied, and when a visitor enters, Quinn deftly makes introductions like he owns the place — only he doesn't. Such is the beauty of Patrick Quinn. His ease with people, with place, with the past and present, make him one of those people you want to know.

"Let's sit in the back," he says after pleasantries are exchanged between the visitor and the regulars. "We can talk better there."

A waitress brings coffee, but only the visitor orders breakfast. "I don't eat breakfast," explains Quinn. "I have coffee."

There is more percolating in Quinn than caffeine. A retired archivist for Northwestern University, where he spent over 30 years preserving the history of the esteemed college, he's also a published author whose curiosity hasn't diminished over his 76 years. The keeper of Lake Geneva's history, he's a reliable source for historical inquiries of all stripes.

"He grew up in Lake Geneva, so he really knows the city probably better than anyone. He knows the history, and knows the people. He's the definition of a local guy, and I mean that in the best possible way."

"I liked history from the time I was a young elementary student," he says, his hands around his mug of justfreshened coffee. "I liked the idea of history."

His weekly column in the *Lake Geneva Regional News* for the last eight years is lively, informative and helps us remember what is easy to forget. He also serves on the boards of the Lake Geneva Historic Preservation Commission, the Friends of the Geneva Theater, the Geneva Lake Museum and the Walworth County Genealogical Society.

Rob Ireland is the general manager and editor of the *Lake Geneva Regional News*. He says community columnists like Quinn are rare in that Quinn provides a perspective that is both well-sourced and personal. "He grew up in Lake Geneva, so he really knows the city probably better than anyone," says Ireland. "He knows the history, and knows the people. He's the definition of a local guy, and I mean that in the best possible way."

A ROUGH BEGINNING

An only child, Patrick Quinn was born to Helen (Wardingle) and Bernard Quinn in 1942 at Lakeland Hospital in Elkhorn. After fighting in the Battle of the Bulge in World War II, his father returned home but not for long. "He split," explains Quinn. "And I was always told he died in a car crash down in Illinois."

In 1945, Quinn lost his mother to pneumonia. Raised by his maternal grandparents, Thomas and Lillie Wilkinson, he thrived in local schools. His high school English teacher, Bruce Johnson, is 92 and can still summon memories of his time with Quinn.

"He and his buddies, they were harmless folks," says Johnson. "They loved to play little tricks, but they were harmless. What can you ask of teenage males? I was a little surprised when I learned he was an archivist because those weren't his inclinations in high school."

Fortunately, time is expansive and allows us to develop into what others, or we ourselves, couldn't see earlier. For Quinn, that meant graduating from Badger High School in 1960 and heading to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he earned a bachelor's degree in English and then entered graduate school. But the civil rights movement and escalating war in Vietnam soon changed his focus.

LIVING HISTORY

"I dropped out of grad school ... I borrowed some money and took a bus to Montgomery, Alabama," he remembers. "I was in the civil rights movement in Selma and was almost killed three times. It was a very dangerous time with the Ku Klux Klan."

Quinn was one of many who helped assemble the physical stage that civil rights leader, Martin Luther King Jr., would speak from following the historic march from Selma to Montgomery.

"The one thing I like to say is that I was the next speaker after Martin Luther King, but not as memorable," he says.

So what were his words? "I told people where the buses were that they needed to get on."

Not a dream-speech, but logistics matter in all movements.

When he returned to Wisconsin, he taught briefly at Racine Park High School. Then history knocked again. The father he thought "died in a car crash down in Illinois," was alive and living in San Francisco. His father's sister, Sister Mary Bernetta Quinn, a well-known Catholic nun and academic whose work in poetry

analysis is still lauded, thought the younger Quinn had a right to know the truth.

"She wrote me a letter in April of '65," Quinn recalls, "and as soon as I got it, I drove out to the Bay Area in California."


FOLLOWING THE CLUES

Joining him on the journey were two friends, one of whom owned the Volvo that powered their search before search engines like Google made such things possible from your sofa.

"We drove non-stop," he remembers. "We made it in 30 hours from Madison to San Francisco. We stopped only to go to the bathroom and pick up beer."

Remarkably, Quinn found his father in just two weeks. "It was difficult," he says. "I found police records all over the place and rooming house records."

Those records eventually led Quinn to an Alcoholics Anonymous Clubhouse in Alameda, east of San Francisco. "I'd been all over the place, so I went there, to this



AA club, and there was this guy polishing the counter there, or making coffee, and I asked him 'Do you know Bernard Quinn?' and he shook his head no and then he asked 'Who wants to know?' and I said 'Tm his son.' And he said 'Barry doesn't have a son.'"

Things then got a wee bit physical, Quinn adds, and in a matter of minutes, anonymity clearly out the window, he had his father's phone number and was dialing from a pay phone. His father picked up after a couple of rings.

"He said 'I'll be there in five minutes.' Five minutes later, he pulls up in an old Buick and we went to a bar to talk," recounts Quinn of their first conversation. "He drank orange juice and I drank beer."

He would learn that his father had struggled with alcohol for decades, even before the war, but eventually found sobriety.

"I got to know him, and we kept in touch," he says.

Quinn's father died three years later at a veteran's hospital in Martinez, California. When he wasn't able to bury him in a veteran's cemetery, Quinn had his body brought to Lake Geneva. "I had him buried next to my mother," he explains.

BUILDING A LIFE AND PRESERVING THE PAST

In 1965, Quinn married his first wife, Martha "Marty" Miller. In 1966, he began working for the Wisconsin State Historical Society and remained there until 1971. The Quinns welcomed two daughters, Abra and Rachel, and remained committed to a life of academia and social justice. In 1972, Quinn joined the Archives Department at UW-Madison and then in 1974 he began his career with the Archives Department at Northwestern University.

On his first day at Northwestern, there were just two, four-drawer filing cabinets of archived material. By the time he retired in 2008, the university archives featured nearly 1,000 collections of papers and records, and over 600,000 photographs and other artifacts.

By 1979, Quinn and Marty divorced, but remained on such good terms that he





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

Retirement certainly hasn't slowed Quinn down. Residing in the home he was raised in with his second wife, Mary (Janzen) Quinn, once the director of Public Programs at the Newberry Library in Chicago, he continues to vigorously remind us of the need to preserve the past. And when he publishes a new book, he makes his way over to his high school English teacher's house.

"Every time he has a new book," says Johnson, "he comes up meekly to my back door, I don't have a front door, and he just comes up meekly, which is not Pat, and says, 'I have this for you.' He's a good man. He's a very stalwart, forward-thinking guy."

Midwestern Muse and Other Poems is his most recent work, and was published by Red Dawn Press in 2014. Vivid, personal and accessible, the collection of poems describes the pursuit of the answers that link us all. "Unmarked Graves" is just 54 words, and was penned following Quinn's search for his great-great-grandparents' final resting place in St. Francis de Sales Cemetery in Lake Geneva. It seems the flat stone markers of William and Rose Quinn's final resting places were buried by a century of sodden soil. So like he's done for over 50 years, Quinn dug - literally dug - until he found an answer, and with it, a precious realization:

Unmarked Graves

I stood staring at the flat grassy plots seeing nothing astonished that there remained no evidence of the two lives that lay beneath me.

such an ignominious end to a long journey begun a century ago an ocean across But then the precious irony came to mind: It was I who was their stone.

Quinn knows, though, that the past always remains partly hidden. Revealed in fragments, we rarely get to piece it together completely. "You never figure everything out," he says, "So I'm always still looking around for all kinds of stuff. You just keep looking."



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
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The Frank Lloyd Wright-designed property overlooked the lake for more than 50 years

The Lake Geneva Hotel opened in 1912 and filled the entire block between Broad and Center streets on the site of the current Geneva Towers Condominiums. In the 1940s it would become known as the Hotel Geneva.

On August 14, 1948, special investigators burst into the Cavern Bar, located in the basement of the Hotel Geneva in Lake Geneva, and announced a raid. An earlier raid the previous week had failed to turn up evidence of a rumored betting operation at the Cavern Bar; that day, all the betting equipment had been moved out before investigators arrived. They suspected that the hotel's co-owner, Hobart Hermansen, had been tipped off. But on their second try, the investigators found more than 50 people engaged in illegal horse-race gambling, or "betting



on the book." Hermansen was the only one arrested that day, but he was quickly released and fined around \$800. The hotel and bar remained open throughout the legal proceedings. It almost had to. In 1948, the Hotel Geneva was the most famous hotel in Lake Geneva, and had been for more than 30 years.

A NEW HOTEL FOR A NEW ERA

The Hotel Geneva began its life as the Lake Geneva Hotel, and had been a point of community pride from its earliest days. In 1911, two entrepreneurial businessmen visiting the area, Arthur L. Richards and John J. Williams, looked at the vacant lot where the grand Whiting House Hotel had once stood (the site of the current Geneva Towers Condominiums), and hatched a business plan. The Whiting House had burned down in 1894, but plans to build a new hotel had stalled. Richards and Williams recognized a huge opportunity in the empty lot, so they



formed the Lake Geneva Hotel Company to sell stock subscriptions in a new hotel venture. Several Lake Geneva summer residents, tycoons of Chicago banking and business, helped to fund the project.

Richards and Williams envisioned an unparalleled year-round resort to rival the famous Tuxedo Club of Tuxedo Park, New York. An editorial in the *Lake Geneva Regional News* extolled the new hotel plan, enthusing that "beauty of design was the first thing considered." To ensure that their new hotel was sufficiently beautiful, modern and memorable for visitors, Richards and Williams decided to hire an internationally famous architect with Wisconsin roots: Frank Lloyd Wright.

FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT AND LAKE GENEVA

The year 1911 was a time of great change for Wright. The previous year, he had left his Oak Park studio, abandoning his wife and children, and departed for a year in Europe with his mistress. Upon his return, he began building a new home and studio for

himself in Spring Green, Wisconsin, which he would call Taliesin. The commission for the Lake Geneva Hotel came at a time when he needed to shore up his social reputation and earn more money to pay off his debts. Although he had designed five private residences and a yacht club on nearby Delavan Lake a decade earlier, the hotel was the first commission Wright received on Geneva Lake, and in fact it would remain the only Wright-designed building on the lake. Wright's design for the hotel was a resounding application of his groundbreaking architectural philosophies, a low, horizontal building intended to blend into the natural environment.

To achieve this, Wright designed the Lake Geneva Hotel as a two-story structure filling the entire block between Broad and Center streets, with the front of the hotel facing the lagoon that flows into the White River. As designed by Wright, the hotel boasted 360 feet of water frontage with a wide, shaded piazza running the length of its front. Although stylistically, the hotel presaged the famous Imperial Hotel Wright would design in Tokyo a few years later, the Lake Geneva Hotel is credited by some architectural historians as the prototype for a new kind of lodging that would proliferate in America a few decades later: the two-story motor hotel.

Construction began in May of 1912 and the hotel opened just three months later with 30 of its 70 total guest rooms ready for occupancy. The formal opening took place a month after that with a grand dinner in the new dining room. According to newspaper accounts at the time, the interior was finished in lightfumed oak and American gum-wood, and decorated in shades of green and brown. The ceilings in the lobby and dining room featured ornate art-glass skylights, which complemented the leaded "Tulip"-style windows for which Wright is now well known. A massive brick fireplace, one of Wright's hallmarks, dominated the lobby. Custom-designed sconces and light fixtures throughout the hotel operated on electricity, the newest technology of the era.

Because Richards and Williams envisioned the hotel as a year-round resort, a large coalburning boiler room took up a significant part of the basement, and each room boasted its own radiator heat. Additionally, a great majority of the rooms came with private baths. (The hotel was connected to the new sewer system that the city of Lake Geneva installed to accommodate its construction.) For the era, Frank Lloyd Wright's Lake Geneva Hotel was cuttingedge and top of the line.

The grand opening of the Lake Geneva Hotel, along with its excellent fine-dining restaurant helmed by a French chef, drew lake residents as well as a sizable faction of tourists to Lake Geneva. Shortly after its opening, the *Lake Geneva Regional News* marveled that during the opening week over 100 "auto machines" were parked in front of the building. Over the next few years, the hotel proved a popular tourist stop, but the building itself presented challenges and was costly to maintain. In the 1930s, the Depression hit the hotel business particularly hard. As a result, ownership and management of the hotel changed hands several times in its first three decades.

THE HERMANSEN HEYDAY

Around 1940, Lake Como innkeeper Christian Hermansen bought the Lake Geneva Hotel (more commonly known by this time as the "Hotel Geneva") and placed it under the management of his son, Harry, with help from brothers Hobart and Inar. The Hermansens had earned a certain notoriety in the area: during Prohibition, their Como Inn housed a well-trafficked speakeasy called The Sewer, which was rumored to have hosted some of Chicago's most infamous gangsters of the era. (Lending some credence to these rumors, in 1932 Hobart Hermansen married Lucille Moran, exwife of famous Chicago gangster George "Bugs" Moran.) The Hermansen family would go on to own the Hotel Geneva for the next 25 years.

Harry's son, retired Hilton Hotels & Resorts Vice President Allen C. Hermansen, remembers working there in the 1940s, while he was a student at







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
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The hotel incorporated 70 guest rooms, many with their own bath and all with radiant heat.

Lake Geneva High School. "I worked there every summer, because the hotel was strictly summer-only at that point," he remembers. "The heating costs in the winter were just too high to keep it open. Every summer I did a little bit of anything that needed to be done." Allen says that his uncle Hobart recruited seasonal employees from a similar winter resort in Hot Springs, Arkansas. "He hired the chef, the bell captain and the maître 'd and told them they could bring their own staff with them," he explains. "They were impressively good at their jobs. I will never forget the sight of one man in his white jacket coming out of the kitchen with a flourish, one fully loaded tray up in *continued on page 36*

the air and another fully loaded tray down here ..." — indicating hip height — "It was quite a sight to behold."

SLOT MACHINES, PONY RIDES AND A SPECIAL VISITOR

According to Allen, his uncle Hobart known in the local papers as the "Slot-Machine King of Walworth County" - managed an underground casino in the basement of the Hotel Geneva. This casino was the target of the 1948 raid, though federal investigators failed to uncover the full operation. (Local stories of tunnels dug from the basement of the Hotel Geneva to the basements of neighboring buildings for the purpose of rum-running during Prohibition may explain how Hobart Hermansen was able to remove the betting equipment without being detected.) "It was mostly an accepted thing back then," Allen explains. "You just paid a little money here and there to the right people and they'd let you keep running [the casino.]"

Not all of the activities at the Hotel Geneva during this time had to take place underground, however. The restaurant and bar proved popular with both tourists and locals. Brochures from the era advertised a wide range of entertainment available to hotel guests:

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253 Broad Street • Lake Geneva, Wisconsin • 262.248.7700 www.haberdapper.com swimming, dancing, golfing, boating, fishing, tennis, riding. Allen remembers that his father made an arrangement with a local stable to keep a few horses and ponies on the north side of the property. Guests could mount their rides at the Hotel Geneva and then follow a guide through downtown Lake Geneva, out to riding trails on Sheridan Springs Road. Children could take pony rides around Flat Iron Park. "I led the ponies one summer," Allen remembers with a laugh. Occasionally, he says his uncle Hobart would put sugar cubes in his pocket and entice a particularly tiny Shetland pony to follow him into the lobby of the hotel, much to the delight of the children staying there.

Following Harry Hermansen's death in the 1950s, Hobart took a larger role in the management of the hotel. One day in 1957, he gave a tour of the property to a very special visitor: Frank Lloyd Wright himself. The venerated architect was back in the area as a guest of Philip K. Wrigley and his wife. After touring the hotel he had designed 46 years earlier, Wright reportedly said that it seemed to be in good condition, and if he were designing it again, he would "make few changes."

A LANDMARK LOST TO CHANGING TASTES

By the 1960s, the Hotel Geneva faced increasing competition from new resorts like The Abbey in Fontana. Frank Lloyd Wright's architecture looked heavy and old-fashioned by comparison to the new, lighter midcentury style. The building remained costly to maintain and business had dropped. The Hermansens decided

to sell the Hotel Geneva to a group of investors that included State Assemblyman George Borg and Majestic Hills Ski Area owner Bill Grunow. Borg and Grunow added a glassed-in swimming pool in front of the building, reconfigured the lobby to include a piano bar and changed the name to the Geneva Inn, hoping to reposition the property as a modern motor hotel.



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




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However, in 1969, Borg and Grunow sold the property again, this time to a Kenosha businessman with plans to raze the building. Some of the interior was salvaged — the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee received more than 100 panes of leaded art glass windows from the hotel, some of which are on long-term loan to the Lake Geneva Public Library. The Geneva Lake Museum also has a few window panes, as well as some of the Wrightdesigned wall sconces that once graced the hotel's walls. But over the winter of 1969-1970, the once-great, Frank Lloyd Wrightdesigned Hotel Geneva was reduced to a pile of rubble.

Williams Bay resident Tom Palmersheim remembers frequenting the Hotel Geneva and speaks for many local residents of the era when he describes the feeling of loss. "It was a different feeling walking into the place," he says. "It was very sad to see it get torn down. There was an aura about it. When you walked in the front door, it was like you walked into a completely different world."



By the 1960s, the Hotel Geneva faced increasing competition from new resorts. New owners George Borg and Bill Grunow made changes to the property, trying to position it as a modern motor hotel, but in 1969 they sold the hotel to a Kenosha businessman, who razed the building.

Old World Wisconsin invites guests to step back in time and relive historic Christmas traditions

No question about it: Old World Wisconsin is excited for Christmas. This year's holiday-themed weekends at the museum, known as "An Old World Christmas," promise to bring even more holiday cheer into the hearts of both young and old. "'More' and 'better' are the plans this year," explains Anna Altschwager, assistant director of guest experiences at Old World Wisconsin in Eagle. The world-class living history museum, managed by the Wisconsin Historical Society, has been hosting Christmas activities for several years, and according to Altschwager, the holidaythemed weekends have only gotten more popular over time. So in the spirit of "more and better," this year the event has expanded from two weekends to three.

HOLIDAY TRADITIONS REVISITED

During "An Old World Christmas," guests are invited to explore the Crossroads Village area of the museum, which contains structures representing Yankee, English, Irish, Welsh, Norwegian and German immigrants, including the popular blacksmith's shop. Altschwager says several Christmas-themed guest experiences are planned, including horse-drawn rides, a brass band playing Christmas music, readings of Laura Ingalls Wilder's descriptions of pioneer Christmas traditions and even Christmas shopping in the general store (using a "time-travel token" system to maintain the historic experience.) And since no Christmas is complete without holiday treats, Altschwager says there will be plenty of food preparation and tasting taking place.

In fact, a majority of the guest experiences planned for the Christmas event seem to center around food and tradition. "For so many of our guests, their own personal holiday traditions are rooted in food," Altschwager says. "The holiday foods only happen once a year, so even if it's been 200

years, that's only 200 Christmases, and we find the traditions move a lot more slowly and are rooted in history." She says guests will have a chance to help make and taste Christmas foods like traditional cookies and candies, Czech braided bread and even Victorian savory puddings. "That's a great opportunity to be hands-on. We hope that if guests learn about one of our foods that we're making, then they will talk about their own traditions."

WISCONSIN'S SCANDINAVIAN PAST COMES TO LIFE

"An Old World Christmas" is also the only place you can see the world's largest yule goat — a larger-than-life-sized figure made out of straw, based on Scandinavian tradition. "The yule goat is a nod to the deep Scandinavian roots we have here in Wisconsin," Altschwager continues. "It's a tradition that has deep pagan roots, with the goat representing fertility and the new year. Today, people often see it in a little ornament or figurine. But traditionally they were these big figures in the center of the community, which you would have instead of a Christmas tree.

Altschwager is thrilled with the excitement people have shown for "An Old World Christmas" in the past, and is looking forward to expanding the experience. "Our stories here are almost all immigrant stories, centering around our shared immigrant past and what we celebrate today through the stories we share," she says. "We're hoping to give people a space to reflect on their own Christmas traditions and what they hope their children and grandchildren continue to do. We're happy to be the space where that happens.

"An Old World Christmas" will take place on the following weekends: Dec. 1-2, Dec. 8-9 and Dec. 15-16. The museum will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on both Saturdays and Sundays. For more information, visit oldworldwisconsin. wisconsinhistory.org

I'm guessing most of us, if we're lucky, have fond childhood memories of spending cold winter days in a warm kitchen, waiting in anticipation to help with holiday baking. Each Christmas, my brothers and I would position ourselves before a floured surface, cookie cutters in hand, ready to begin one of our family's annual traditions. Our festive cutouts were always less than perfect and maybe we scattered a little (well, more than a little) flour on the floor, but my mother encouraged our enthusiasm as she gingerly placed the cookies on a baking sheet and into the oven.

Memories, which evoke Norman Rockwell-like images, emerge easily, especially this time of year. They are centered in our very core and make us who we are. Chances are you've gathered your own children and perhaps grandchildren together to share your family's holiday baking traditions. Maybe you've even started brand new traditions, inviting friends to a baking party where recipes are swapped and a glass of holiday cheer is enjoyed.

The staff of *At The Lake* includes several very talented bakers. And our gift to you this holiday season is a collection of some of their favorite cookie recipes. We hope you take the time to try them and add them to your holiday baking traditions, building new memories along the way. Enjoy!

VANILLA SANDWICH COOKIES: KRISTINA HUGASIAN

INGREDIENTS:

Cookies ¾ cup sugar 1 stick unsalted butter, softened 1 stick vegetable shortening 2 ¾ cups all-purpose flour 2 egg yolks 2 packets vanilla sugar (found at European or specialty grocery stores) 1⁄2 tsp. salt zest of 1 lemon

Filling

1/2 cup jam or spreadable preserves (apricot or marmalade are traditional, but I've also used raspberry)

> **Topping** 1 cup powdered sugar 1 cup sugar

DIRECTIONS:

1. In a large bowl, beat sugar, butter and vegetable shortening with a mixer until well blended. Add egg yolks, lemon zest and vanilla sugar. Beat until light and fluffy. Add flour and salt, mix well.

2. Chill dough in the refrigerator for one hour.

3. Preheat oven to 325 F and line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

4. On a flat, floured surface, roll out a section of dough to about a ¼" thickness. Using a small (approximately 1" to 1 ½" wide) cookie cutter, cut out circles and place on the prepared cookie sheet at least ½" apart. A shot glass works great.

5. Bake for 13 minutes, or until edges are just golden. Cookies will crumble apart if they're overdone. Cool completely.

6. Spread a thin layer of jam on the bottom of a cookie, then top it with another to create a sandwich.

7. Mix remaining sugar and powdered sugar in a small bowl. Gently roll sandwiched cookies in sugar, coat well. Store in an airtight container for 1-2 days before serving. If necessary, reroll in sugar before presenting.

CHOCOLATE CUTOUT COOKIES: KRISTEN ROUSE

INGREDIENTS:

3/4 cup unsalted butter, room temperature

1 cup sugar 1 large egg 1 tsp. vanilla 1 ½ cups flour ¾ cup cocoa powder 1 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. salt

DIRECTIONS:

1. Beat butter in mixer for 1 minute until smooth. Add sugar and beat until fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla on high. Scrape bowl.

2. Sift flour and cocoa powder together. Whisk in baking powder and salt. On low, slowly mix in wet ingredients until combined.

3. Chill for at least an hour.

4. Preheat oven to 350 F. Roll and cut out dough. Bake for 10 minutes.



CHEWY MOLASSES COOKIES WITH A KICK: HOLLY LEITNER

INGREDIENTS:

2 cups all-purpose flour 1 ½ tsp. baking soda 1 tsp. ground cinnamon ½ tsp. ground nutmeg ¼ - ½ tsp. cayenne pepper (depending on your heat preference) ½ tsp. salt 1 ½ cups sugar ¾ cup (1 ½ sticks) unsalted butter, softened 1 large egg ¼ cup molasses

DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat oven to 350 F. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, cayenne pepper and salt. In a shallow bowl, place ½ cup sugar; set aside.

2. With an electric mixer, beat butter and remaining cup of sugar until combined. Beat in egg and then molasses until combined. Reduce speed to low; gradually mix in dry ingredients, just until dough forms.

3. Pinch off and roll dough into balls, each equal to 1 Tbsp.

4. Roll balls in reserved sugar to coat.

5. Arrange balls on baking sheets, about 3" apart. Bake, one sheet at a time, until edges of cookies are just firm, 10 to 15 minutes. (Cookies can be baked two sheets at a time, but they will not crackle uniformly).

6. Cool 1 minute on baking sheets; transfer to racks to cool completely.

Makes 36 cookies

MELTING MOMENTS: DEANN HAUSNER

INGREDIENTS:

1 cup butter, softened 1/3 cup powdered sugar 1/8 tsp. salt 1 cup all-purpose flour 3/4 cup cornstarch

DIRECTIONS:

1. In mixing bowl, cream butter, sugar and salt.

2. In separate bowl, combine flour and cornstarch, gradually add to creamed mixture. Shape into 1 ½-inch balls, chill for 1 hour.

3. Preheat oven to 350 F. Place dough balls on ungreased cookie sheets, let stand for 10 minutes.

4. Flatten slightly. Bake at 350 F for approx. 15 minutes or until bottoms are golden brown.

5. Cool on cookie sheets for 2 minutes, then transfer to wire racks to cool completely.

6. Spread with Icing.

Makes approximately 2 dozen.

ICING:

2 Tbsp. butter, softened 1 cup powdered sugar 2 Tbsp. half-and-half 1 tsp. almond extract

DIRECTIONS:

In small bowl, beat butter, sugar, cream and extract until smooth.

SITTIN' PRETTY PEANUT COOKIES: ASHLEY DUCHEMIN

INGREDIENTS:

½ cup butter, softened
¼ cup packed brown sugar
1 egg, separated
½ tsp. vanilla extract
1 cup all-purpose flour
¼ tsp. salt
1 cup finely chopped peanuts, toasted
½ cup vanilla frosting
Peanut M&Ms

DIRECTIONS:

1. In a bowl, cream butter and brown sugar. Beat in egg yolk and vanilla. Combine flour and salt; gradually add to creamed mixture. Cover and refrigerate for 2 hours.

2. Roll into 1" balls. In a small bowl, beat egg white. Dip balls into egg white, then roll in peanuts. Place 2" apart on ungreased baking sheets. 3. Bake at 350 F for 5 minutes. Remove from oven; using the end of a wooden spoon handle, make an indentation in the center of each.

4. Bake 7-9 minutes longer or until firm. Remove to wire racks to cool. Fill centers with vanilla frosting and top with M&Ms.

EASY OREO TRUFFLES: CINDY SMITH

INGREDIENTS:

 1 package Oreo cookies, crushed (Reserve 4-6 cookies to crush for topping.)
 1, 8 oz. package regular cream cheese, room temperature ½ lb. milk chocolate or white chocolate bark coating

DIRECTIONS:

1. Mix cream cheese and Oreo crumbs with mixer.

2. Roll into balls and place on parchment lined cookie sheet. Chill for 30-60 minutes.

3. When cookies have chilled, melt milk chocolate or white chocolate bark coating in the microwave or a double boiler.

4. Using 2 forks, dip the truffles in the melted coating and return to parchment lined pan.

5. Sprinkle with a few of the reserved crumbs for decoration.

INGREDIENTS:

1 package chocolate chips 1 package butterscotch chips 1 ½ cups corn flakes 1 ½ cups peanuts

DIRECTIONS:

1. Microwave chocolate and butterscotch chips for 1 ½ minutes until melted.

2. Pour in corn flakes and peanuts.

3. Drop onto wax paper, cool in refrigerator or freezer.

Ultimate Breakfast Casseroles Feeding a large crowd is as simple as a little prep the night before

It's easy to become grumpy in the wintertime. Sometimes the weather can get to you, especially due to the lack of sunlight. And as much as we look forward to the holidays, let's face it, they can be very stressful. We have a large family, so the holidays mean a lot of cooking. Sometimes I could easily stay in the kitchen all day. Breakfast can be especially trying as everyone chooses their own time to rise and still expects mom and dad to serve them something.

Tired of hours in the kitchen? Try some of these breakfast casseroles and life will get better quickly. All but one can be made the evening before and quickly slipped into the oven while you have your morning coffee and tell Alexa to play some quiet music. Here are some of my favorites:

THE BIG BREAKFAST CASSEROLE

Remember the McDonald's Big Breakfast? This recipe reminds me of that in an easy-to-serve casserole format. It is as complete a meal as you could want. And, when it comes out of the oven it is golden brown and puffy like a quiche. The crowd will go wild.

Servings: 12

Ingredients:

8 cups (loosely packed) brioche bread, cut into ¾-inch cubes. (One loaf will give you more than enough)

3 Tbsp. olive oil

- 3 onions, thinly sliced
- 1 tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. sugar

1 lb. ham (thickly sliced), diced

12 eggs

- 3 cups whole milk
- 1 tsp. dry mustard

1/2 tsp. freshly grated nutmeg

4 tsp. fresh thyme leaves

2 cups grated Gruyère cheese (about 8 ounces)

Directions:

- 1. Prepare all of the ingredients so you will be able to quickly assemble the dish.
- 2. Grease a 10" x 14" baking dish and line with cubed bread.
- 3. Heat the olive oil in a skillet over medium to low heat. Add the onions, salt, and sugar. Sauté until they are lightly caramelized (a medium golden-brown color), about 15 minutes.
- 4. Add the ham and cook about 5 minutes more.
- 5. Spread onion and ham over the bread cubes and sprinkle the grated Gruyère on top.
- 6. Whisk together the eggs, milk, dry mustard, nutmeg, and thyme in a separate mixing bowl. Season with salt and pepper.
- 7. Pour the egg mixture over the bread, ham and onions.
- 8. Press down on the top gently, so that all the bread cubes get soaked with the egg mixture. Cover and refrigerate overnight.
- 9. In the morning, preheat the oven to 350 F. Take the casserole out of the fridge while the oven is preheating.
- Bake, uncovered, for 50-60 minutes, or until the edges are bubbling, the top begins to brown, and the whole dish puffs up. Make sure the entire top is puffed up including the very middle.

Serve with some fresh fruit, or just a tall Bloody Mary.



SHANNON'S QUICHE CUPS

These little cups are extremely versatile. If you are having a fancy breakfast, they really fit the bill and you will get lots of compliments. Kids and grandkids also love them, and you can pop them into the oven whenever needed. They take a little more time to make, but they are worth the trouble.

Servings: 24, but some will easily eat two

Ingredients:

Ib. breakfast sausage
 cup onion, diced finely
 cup green pepper, diced finely
 Tbsp. olive oil
 cup of white button mushrooms, sliced
 eggs
 cup milk
 cup grated mozzarella cheese
 cup scallions
 Salt and pepper
 cup sour cream

The Gear:

Muffin tin 24 Muffin cup liners

Directions:

- 1. Put the liners in the muffin tin and spray the insides of the liners with non-stick cooking spray or rub with olive oil.
- 2. Sauté onion, pepper and mushrooms in olive oil, about 4 minutes.
- 3. Add sausage, salt and pepper and cook until done. Set aside to cool.
- 4. Whisk together eggs, milk, cheese and scallions.
- 5. Combine meat and egg mixtures and ladle into muffin cups. Store in the refrigerator until ready to use.
- 6. Preheat oven to 350 F. Let the tin warm to room temperature while the oven is preheating.
- 7. Bake for 20-25 minutes until golden brown. Cool, remove liner, and serve with a dollop of sour cream.



BISQUICK COFFEE CAKE

Sometimes we need something a little sweeter for breakfast and this casserole offers that and more. Even though you have to make it the same morning, it's quick and easy. This is a great dish to take to church or to a family brunch.

Servings: 12

Ingredients:

- **Dough:** 4 cups Bisquick
- 1 cup milk
- 3 eggs
- 4 Tbsp. sugar

Topping:

- cup Bisquick
 cup brown sugar
 tsp. cinnamon
 oz. butter (one stick)
 cup raspberry or blackberry jam
- 1 cup of raspberries or blackberries

Directions:

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 400 F.
- 2. Grease a 10"x 14" baking dish.
- 3. Mix the dough ingredients and pour into baking pan.
- 4. For the topping, cut the butter into very small pieces and cream



together with the Bisquick, brown sugar and cinnamon. Use your fingers or a fork and mix until it has texture like oatmeal.

- 5. Fold in the jam and spread topping mixture over the top of the dough with a rubber or silicone spatula.
- 6. Use a butter knife to make a checkerboard pattern with 1" squares on the top. The objective is to push some of the topping down into the cake.
- 7. Add the berries and press down into the top surface.
- 8. Bake for 30 minutes or until done in the very center of the cake. Insert a table knife and if it comes out clean, the cake is done.

THE FRENCH TOAST CASSEROLE

So if you have tried the Big Breakfast Casserole and want to change it up a bit, here is a good alternative — the French Toast Casserole. Everyone has a version of this recipe, but there is a reason for that. It's very good and very easy to make.

Servings: 12

Ingredients:

- 1 baguette, sliced about 1/2" thick
- 8 eggs
- 1 ¹/₂ cups milk
- 1 cup half-and-half
- 2 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 Tbsp. vanilla extract
- 1 tsp. cinnamon

For the topping:

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1⁄4 cup flour
- 1/2 cup walnuts
- ¹/₂ cup golden raisins
- 4 Tbsp. butter

Directions:

- 1. Grease a 10" x 14" baking dish and carefully arrange the bread slices. You should be able to get two layers with one baguette.
- 2. Mix together eggs, milk, half-and-half, sugar, vanilla, and cinnamon. Pour over bread.
- 3. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 1 hour or overnight.
- 4. When ready to bake, preheat oven to 350 F. Let the dish warm to room temperature while the oven preheats.
- 5. To prepare the topping, combine the brown sugar and flour in a mixing bowl. Cut the butter into small pieces and add to the sugar-flour mixture. With your fingers or a fork, cream butter into the sugar-flour mixture until it resembles oatmeal. Mix in the walnuts and raisins and spread the topping over the bread and egg mixture.
- 6. Cover with foil and bake for 25 minutes. Uncover and bake for another 25 minutes or until golden brown and puffed up like a soufflé.
- 7. Serve with maple syrup, jam or marmalade. A cold glass of Sancerre can really add a pleasant touch. ▲

BEYOND THE BLUES

Although winter can be fun and magical, many struggle with the lack of sunlight and experience Seasonal Affective Disorder

Poet Anne Bradstreet once said, "If we had no winter, the spring would not be so pleasant."

While that's certainly true, it's a safe bet that many of us would be willing to enjoy fall, skip winter completely and head directly into spring. Wouldn't it be pleasant to soak up Wisconsin's beauty without the icy roads, snow shoveling and frigid temperatures? For some Midwesterners, these winter woes are mild inconveniences at best. They go about their days throughout each season with unchanged mood levels and a generally sunny outlook toward life.

And then there are those of us who experience winter in a dramatically different way. For some, feelings about winter go far beyond the standard "winter blues." For 10 percent of Wisconsin residents, winter is when they endure a condition called Seasonal Affective Disorder or SAD.

The National Institute of Mental Health defines Seasonal Affective Disorder as "a type of depression that comes and goes with the seasons, typically starting in the late fall and early winter and going away during the spring and summer." They go on to detail the symptoms of SAD, which can include anything from low energy to carbohydrate cravings.

We asked two mental health professionals to explain the ins and outs of SAD, and to share their best tips to improve symptoms.

THE BASICS OF SAD

Licensed Professional Counselor Joseph Fairbanks is the outpatient lead psychotherapist at Elkhorn's Aurora Behavioral Health Center. Specializing in affective disorders and depression, he is well-versed in the lows that his patients experience during the winter months.

Fairbanks says, "We don't know the exact causes of SAD, but it's believed that it's triggered by a decrease in sunlight, and the effect the decrease in sunlight has on a person's biological clock or the production of hormones like serotonin or melatonin."

Dr. Shilagh Mirgain, senior psychologist at Madison's UW Health, adds that that SAD is "a form of Major Depressive Disorder," and that the winter blues can be considered a less-serious version of SAD.

She says, "Many people find a lesser form of lower mood called the winter blues that isn't an official diagnosis. They just feel more down, have less energy and less motivation, sleep more and crave carbohydrates, but the symptoms aren't causing impairment or distress."

For those whose moods turn upside-down every winter, SAD can wreak havoc on their daily lives, and they are in their very own category. Mirgain says that symptoms can include low mood, less enjoyment in activities, sleep disturbances, appetite changes, fatigue, moving more slowly, increased agitation and cognitive difficulties.

Beyond the physical effects, Mirgain says that SAD can contribute to becoming sedentary and socially isolated. Sufferers feel less motivated and have difficulty concentrating at work. They also tend to eat unhealthy food and want to sleep more frequently.

WHO IS AFFECTED?

Fairbanks says that about 4 to 6 percent of people have winter depression that peaks between December and February, and another 10 to 20 percent may deal with mild SAD symptoms. That's across the country. Here in Wisconsin, those numbers are more concentrated.

"Because symptoms appear to be triggered by a decrease in sunlight, it's more common in climates where there is less sunlight in winter months, like Wisconsin," Fairbanks says, adding, "Up to 10 percent of Wisconsin residents deal with some sort of winter depression, according to a recent study."

Mirgain shares that young people are more susceptible. She says, "The age group that is most vulnerable to depression is ages 18 to 29."

And, women tend to be more affected by SAD than men. Fairbanks says, "Women tend to get the disorder much more than men, and usually, people first develop SAD in their 20s."

Mirgain agrees, saying, "Women are at greater risk in general than men for developing depression, at a rate of 1.5 to 3 times higher."

Lastly, Fairbanks says that family history also plays a role. "More than half of people with SAD have a close relative who suffers from severe depression," he says.

BRIGHT IDEAS TO TREAT SAD

Luckily, there's light at the end of the tunnel and there happen to be several treatment options available to those who deal with SAD.

Before setting out to alleviate your symptoms, you should first make an appointment with your doctor. As Fairbanks advises, "It's always best to talk to your doctor about your symptoms before trying any treatment." Mirgain says that if you're especially struggling, talking to your physician about medication or psychotherapy can be helpful.

After discussing your options with your doctor, you can move forward into several directions when it comes to your treatment. Your first line of defense can be something called a light box.

Fairbanks explains, "Light therapy simulates natural sunlight exposure that you don't get during the winter months. Patients who use bright light therapy for 30 minutes to two hours a day often start to feel better within a week. It is important to continue to use light therapy until the seasons change, or the depression may come back. An at-home light therapy kit can be purchased online or in many stores for anywhere from \$50 to \$200."

Mirgain uses a light box, and she advises to make sure your light box has a minimum of 10,000 LUX, which is the

amount of light that the sun emits. She uses hers in the morning, since using it later in the day can impact sleep. She says, "Make sure not to stare directly into the light as it can damage the retina of the eye."

Vitamin D, otherwise known as the "sunshine vitamin," is also a powerful ally in the fight against SAD. Mirgain says, "Vitamin D3 supplements are a useful way to prevent the winter blues as those of us living in Wisconsin are not getting Vitamin D3 naturally as the sun's rays aren't strong enough to give our body what we need. Mushrooms and fish contain natural forms of Vitamin D, so make sure to include these in your diet."

Last but not least — get outside, even if the weather is frightful.

Fairbanks says, "Winter is a good time to get outside and learn to enjoy winter sports with others. In Walworth

County, there are several cross-country ski trails, hiking trails, opportunities for ice skating and other winter sports."

Mirgain is on the same page, and says, "If it is a nice, warmer, sunny day, I always encourage people to get outside and have exposure to the sun."

And if all else fails, we can take comfort in knowing that seasons are temporary, and better days lie ahead when winter melts into spring. 🛦

Woman on a Mission

Founder of Walworth County Adult Special Olympics program dedicates life to making a difference

From the time she served as a candy striper at age 15, Betty Aguirre knew she wanted to help people. Years later, when she had a son with special needs, that fire inside her only grew.

One fateful day in July 1968 while attending the first international Special Olympics Games at Chicago's Soldier Field, Aguirre met Eunice Kennedy Shriver, the organization's founder, whose compassion for others was contagious.

Kennedy Shriver — the sister of President John F. Kennedy and Sen. Robert F. Kennedy — established "Camp Shriver" six years earlier as a way to provide organized physical activity for children with intellectual disabilities, and the concept quickly permeated across the world. Aguirre had followed Kennedy Shriver's work, and relished the opportunity to thank her role model that day.

"I wish I was a fraction of what that lady was," Aguirre says. "She had a dream and helped so many people, and her dream is still here and helping so many people today."

Meeting Kennedy Shriver sparked something in Aguirre that she couldn't ignore. A few years after that meeting, Aguirre began volunteering with a Special Olympics program in Illinois. She became a champion for her son and other individuals facing intellectual, physical, mental or emotional challenges. "I wanted Jamie to have different opportunities and said, 'Hey, I want others to have those opportunities, too," Aguirre says.

When Jamie graduated from the special education program at Lakeland School in Elkhorn, Aguirre was surprised by the lack of options for his future. "I thought, 'Gosh, we've got to do something about this,'" Aguirre says.

With that in mind and almost 10 years of volunteering with Special Olympics already under her belt, Aguirre founded the Walworth County Adult Special Olympics program.

Since then, her efforts have only grown stronger.

BUILDING A FOUNDATION

Walworth County Adult Special Olympics is a branch under the Special Olympics of Wisconsin, but it does not receive funding or resources from the parent organization. Instead, Aguirre works tirelessly to raise money for equipment, transportation, uniforms and other expenses year-round.

She founded the nonprofit in 1986 with seven athletes, and today, more than 200 from the region participate.

Individuals can choose from eight seasonal sports: bowling — which is recreational, not competitive — and volleyball in the fall; basketball in the winter; aquatics and track and field in the spring; and bocce ball, softball and tennis in the summer.

Traditionally, the tennis season culminates with a competition in August. However, reduced practice time due to poor weather conditions this past year led Aguirre to seek use of the indoor courts at the Lake Geneva Tennis Club, and beginning this year, the club will offer skills training yearround at no cost to the nonprofit. "Tennis is wonderful for hand-eye coordination," Aguirre says. "I asked Paul Lauterbach at the Tennis Club to help because I wanted to take the program to another level."

Some individuals choose their favorite sport while others compete in one each season, and a handful are involved in everything they are eligible for, Aguirre says. However, bocce ball, bowling and basketball generally draw the most participation.

Beyond the physical benefits, according to Aguirre, the structure of learning a sport,

attending practice and competing on select weekends applies a crucial lesson in responsibility. "When you see them going to practices and going to competitions, you see what it can do for an individual and how it changes their life," Aguirre says.

Athletes also learn team work, accountability, respect and social skills — traits that might be hard to come by in other settings. "They reap so many benefits from this program," Aguirre says.

While the international Special Olympics offers a program for young athletes, ages 3 to 8, Walworth County's chapter accepts anyone who is 8 and older. Right now, the local program includes individuals ranging in age from 14 to 65.

However, Aguirre has begun working on incorporating a starter program for kids who are even younger. "They're starting at 3 and 4 years of age, just getting a racket in their hand, learning how to bounce a ball, getting a ball over the net," Aguirre says. "I think it can be very instrumental to so many people to come in at a young age."

A COLLABORATIVE EFFORT

In addition to Lake Geneva Tennis Club offering its space, Badger High School allows local Special Olympians to practice basketball and softball at the school at no cost, and Elkhorn High School donates the use of its track. However, that's far from the only support the program receives. The Geneva Lakes Family YMCA holds "Y nights" for the athletes once a week to teach the importance of exercise. Aguirre also seeks donations from various organizations throughout the year and hosts two major fundraisers. Her pitch to new donors often includes the fact that transportation for the program alone costs \$9,000 annually.

"They always say, 'What is it you need?' and I'm not the person to say, 'Give me \$500 or \$1,000," she says. "I say, 'Whatever you want to give us, it is accepted."

In August, Aguirre hosts an informal pig roast and raffle at Lake Geneva's Champs' Sports Bar & Grill. When she began the fundraiser "many, many years" ago, it only brought in about \$200. This year, the event netted more than \$12,000.

Simple Café in Lake Geneva hosts the group's second major fundraiser in October. During this campaign, Special Olympians take the spotlight to share with community members how the program has affected their lives, talk about state competitions and show off their medals.

Aguirre says there's always a full house, and the event gets a great response. "It's heartwarming to know you have all of these people that want to see you succeed because they know it's benefiting so many people," she says.

Being part of a small, tight-knit community also helps, according to Aguirre. "You get to know a lot of people who know you by your first name," she says. "It's a wonderful spot to live in."

UNSUNG HEROES

With such a demanding task at hand, Aguirre cannot run the program on her own. Across all sports, the Walworth County Adult Special Olympics program has about 15 to 20 rotating volunteers. But according to Aguirre, she's always looking for more. "Volunteers are the backbone of any organization," she says.

In some cases, for instance, Special Olympians may need one-on-one attention. Community members can volunteer for a day — such as on-site the day of the bocce and basketball skills competitions at Badger High School – or they can become long-term volunteers who help at weekly practices.

"I'm just so indebted to these wonderful people who believe in this program and believe in these athletes," Aguirre says. "That's what makes it work. Those are the pillars of a great foundation, and it makes the lives of these individuals truly worthwhile."

For the sake of the 200 athletes whose lives she touches on a weekly basis, Aguirre says she hopes the program continues forever.

She no longer worries about Jamie, who is 46 years old now and has worked at Grand Geneva Resort for about six years. For Aguirre, it's humbling to see her hard work paying off.

"I've been volunteering with Special Olympics for 42 years," she says. "You feel like everyone has a mission in life, and yep, this is mine."

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

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
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


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
