

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

#### FREDERICK TACKLES HUNGER

Big Foot High School and UW-Madison graduate Travis Frederick has made a name for himself on the football field as the starting center for the Dallas Cowboys. His reputation as one of the best linemen in the league coupled with his work off the field to combat hunger landed him a spot as one of the 32 nominees for the NFL's prestigious Walter Peyton Man of the Year Award. Although the honor went to Houston Texans' J.J. Watt, who was presented with the award on February 3, Frederick received a \$50,000 donation to further his work with his Blocking Out Hunger Foundation.

Through an email interview, Frederick told *At The Lake*, a little bit about his foundation and its mission:

"The mission of Travis Frederick's Blocking Out Hunger Foundation is to provide support for inner-city and low-income children throughout Metro Dallas who struggle with hunger," says Frederick. "In Dallas County alone, 64 percent of Dallas Public School students and 84 percent of Dallas Independent School District students are eligible for the free and reduced lunch program. Essentially, three out of every four students rely on their schools for daily nourishment," he explains.

An important facet of the Foundation is its Nourish2Flourish Community Outreach Program which works with North Texas Food Bank to provide regular deliveries of food to kids when school is closed for summer and winter breaks. According to Frederick, hunger and malnutrition increase during these times because kids don't have access to free/reduced cost lunches. As a result of Blocking Out Hunger's efforts, during summer 2017, 200 kids received a box of food each week for 10 weeks for a total of 2,000 meals. Over the 2017 winter break, the Foundation's Nourish2Flourish Program provided three meals a day for 713 kids — a total of 30,000 meals.

In addition, the Foundation has created Travis' Food Pantry at Fort Worth-based Trinity Basin Preparatory, a public charter school serving low-income students. Every Thursday and Friday, 70 kids from 35 families are able to access canned goods and produce from the pantry.

Even though thousands have already been helped, Frederick's 2018 goal is to provide at least 80,000 meals to atrisk Dallas area children. "Another goal," he says is "for the foundation to positively impact the experiences, emotions and reactions of the children who are receiving meals and identifying the children that need the most help in terms of food assistance."

Frederick explains that growing up in Walworth County he was unaware of the real need that existed to help the hungry. "Being in school, we had several food drives for the local food pantries; however, it wasn't until I was looking for a cause to get behind that I saw how bad the hunger issue is in our country. Being in Dallas and being able to help bridge the gap between the generosity and need has been very eye opening."

#### NEW RESCUE BOAT DEDICATED

After a multi-year fundraising campaign, the Fontana Fire Department unveiled its new rescue airboat on Saturday, Jan. 20.

"Renbo 53," the new airboat manufactured by Midwest Rescue Boats, is able to withstand extreme conditions, making dangerous ice rescues much more possible. The boat can travel up to 100 mph through ice, snow and water. In addition, it's equipped with sonar to see below the water's surface and infrared equipment making search efforts possible at night.

Fundraising efforts led by the Reninger family resulted in the boat purchase after the tragic death of Mark Reninger in a snowmobile accident on February 15, 2016. Reninger, 53, was snowmobiling across frozen Geneva Lake with a friend when they hit thin ice and open water far from shore. The friend was able to pull himself out of the water and call for help on a cell phone.

According to reports, the two were at one of the farthest points from shore on



the 5,400-acre lake. The volunteer rescue department was not able to safely reach them by foot, and they did not have a safe vehicle to traverse the conditions. By the time the team made it to the location, Reninger had drowned.

After the tragic accident, Reninger's family wanted to find a solution for Geneva Lake. The family began gathering donations to obtain a state-of-the-art rescue boat, and in just two years, with

more than \$200,000 raised, the boat was unveiled.

The Fontana Fire Department would like to thank all of those who helped with the fundraising campaign. "You see, when tragic things happen it can tear at your heart and your family," says Fontana Fire Chief Wolfgang Nitsch. "But from those dark moments something of a miracle happens and new people unite as an entirely stronger more complex family."





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#### Thanks to the Lake Geneva chapter of the Lyric Opera of Chicago, nearly 1,000 seventh-graders in the Geneva Lakes area have experienced an opera performance.

In the past five years, students from Lake Geneva, Fontana, Reek, Sharon and Walworth schools have benefited from the Lyric Opera's educational outreach program through field trips to the opera

house in Chicago. "The kids are in total awe because most of them have never been to that type of professional music performance," Lake Geneva Chapter President Vivian Fabbro Keenan says.

**PROGRAM SENDS** 

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The Lake Geneva organization pays for buses and trains, opera tickets and a food stipend for about 450 students to take part in the trip each school year. This past year, students were treated to performances of *Rigoletto* in October, *Turandot* in January and *Faust* in March.

"We get notes from the students saying this is the best field trip they've ever attended, and that we have a great impact on them," Fabbro Keenan says. "Many students have never been on a train before, many had not been in the city of Chicago before, or seen buildings that tall, so it's really a trip of firsts for many."

Fabbro Keenan says the Lake Geneva chapter, which was founded 22 years ago, takes pride in the fact that it can provide this opportunity for so many children at such an impressionable age. "We're looking at how we can we broaden their horizons to include classical musical events rather than just rock and popular music, and we have been extremely successful at that," she says.

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Thompson, who turns 73 in May, has been involved with the fair for over 60 years, and last November he was recognized with the Heritage Award by the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) at its 127th Annual Convention in Las Vegas. The award, given annually, recognizes the achievements of outstanding fair volunteers.

"I was rather surprised and certainly very honored," he says of the award. "It certainly is great to be recognized by your peers for something you've done. I certainly enjoy all the things I do for the fair, but it's nice to know that other people appreciate it."

Thompson's long involvement with the Walworth County Fair began as a kid when he tagged along as his parents volunteered, and then later when he participated in 4-H and FFA events.



He continued his work through college, where he earned a degree in agriculture education before teaching horticulture at Badger High School for 20 years.

In addition, Thompson has mentored children as an FFA adviser, 4-H leader,

fair judge and Walworth County Fair FFA youth superintendent. He became a member of the fair board in 2003.

When not attending to business related to the fair, Thompson devotes his time to a number of organizations including the Geneva Area Foundation Board, the Walworth County Economic Development Alliance Board, the Wisconsin Association of Fairs and the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

"Walworth County is a great place to live and has a lot of great people, and it's fun to be able to interact with those people," he says.

Thompson has helped at the Wisconsin State Fair for years, but he'll always feel a bigger connection to the county fair because it has more youth and family involvement as well as educational opportunities. "I may be a little bit biased," he says, "but I think the Walworth County Fair is the best of all."









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#### LONG-TIME EDUCATOR WRITES BOOK

For nearly 40 years, Carol McLernon taught first and third grade in the Lake Geneva public schools and St. Francis de Sales Catholic School, often as a reading specialist. "I loved teaching. It was providence, I think," McLernon says. "It was meant to be."


Now living in Whitewater, McLernon began writing books near the end of her career, and she has written seven to date, including her latest title — a children's book, *Treasured Memories: World's Columbian Exposition of 1893.* 

The book, which revolves around the world's fair in Chicago, was expected to be released in February with distribution on Amazon.com, at Barnes and Noble and through Archway Self-Publishing.

The idea for the book comes from a doll McLernon was given by a next-door neighbor, whose father had brought it home from the world's fair. A sewing aficionado, McLernon made hundreds of dresses for it, and even made a wedding dress for the doll's 100th "birthday." After her neighbor died, McLernon's family helped clean out the house and found boxes of old pictures, papers and journals. The new information gave McLernon more story ideas, and she began writing.

McLernon is set to appear May 1 for the Geneva Lake Museum's "Tuesdays @ 2" program, where she will speak about the 125th anniversary of the 1893 world's fair opening. "It's a coincidence that I'm speaking on the very day the fair opened, and I think it's awesome," she says.

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

CHEF JOHN BOGAN SHARES HIS CULINARY KNOWLEDGE AND ENSURES THE COOKING IS ALWAYS FUN AND THE DINING ALWAYS DELICIOUS

# **It's more than a cooking class, it's a party too.**

The place is rocking. Feet are tapping to pumped-in music. People are chattering, mugging for pictures, bragging about the dishes they're creating and asking the chefs for more know-how. There's even a TV set, tuned into a college football game.

It's a fun atmosphere, and at the center is the master of ceremonies, the joke-a-minute guy, the maestro, Chef John Bogan, who runs the Lake Geneva School of Cooking.

Nestled in the corner of an old church at 727 Geneva Street, in Lake Geneva, the school is composed of four rooms — two adjoining dining rooms, a kitchen where the meal preparation occurs, and a room filled with fine wines. As the French say, "mise en place" — everything in its place.

Bogan bought the school in 2008. In July he'll celebrate 10 years of operation. Before that, Bogan was the general manager and chief chef at Kirsch's at the French Country Inn, a Lake Geneva restaurant long renowned for its food.

#### A PASSION IS REALIZED

Born in upstate New York, Bogan was destined to be a chef from early on. "Some people are made to be football players. Some people are made to be garbage collectors," he says. "I was made to be a chef."

Growing up in a time before video games, Bogan, like all kids of that era, had to make his own fun. He found it in cooking. His early experiences in the kitchen with his grandmother led to working summers for his uncle, a former chef in New Orleans, where he worked twelve-hour days, six days a week.

"What? This is not a summer vacation," he thought. But the job grew on him. "I loved the sizzling. I loved the smells. I loved something as simple as cutting radish roses and putting them in cold water and watching them curl," he told a reporter for a story in the *Janesville Gazette*.

The busier it got, the more he enjoyed it. He enjoyed the staff and taking care of people. "Right then, I decided I wanted to be that guy. I wanted to be a chef."

He went on to get his formal education at Johnson and Wales University in Providence, Rhode Island, where he received an associate degree in culinary arts and a bachelor's degree in food service management.

In his professional career, he's produced a live educational culinary show and was featured chef in the official magazine of The American Culinary Federation, *The National Culinary Review*.

As he grew in his profession, his chef's hat grew along with him. Bogan's tall hat signifies his expertise — the higher the hat the more heralded the chef. "There are a lot of different hats. I don't wear a baseball hat or a bandana," he says. "I love wearing a chef's hat."

Bogan's experience eventually led him to the Midwest. He met his wife in Chicago. A Hawaiian transplant, she went there because "she wanted to see snow," he says. They have two daughters — one of whom helped Bogan this particular night — and a one-year-old grandson.

#### THE JOY OF COOKING

On this cold evening, personable servers meet us at the door of the Lake Geneva Cooking School with glasses of sparkling wine.

Bogan greets us in full chef regalia — the hat of course, called a toque, and a white double-breasted jacket. He knows our names. We soon find out that he knows everyone's name including those who have taken a class from him before and traveled a long way to do it again.



# CLASSES FOR EVERY OCCASION

The Lake Geneva School of Cooking offers a variety of classes throughout the year as well as private events for birthdays, anniversaries, bridal showers, bachelorette and kid's parties, weddings and book clubs. They also offer classes for kids, catering and corporate team building events and classes that you normally don't equate with the culinary arts — like tailgating.

## BOGAN'S HIGH SCHOOL CONNECTION

In addition to operating the Lake Geneva School of Cooking, Bogan also works with the Badger High School culinary program and has seen many students move on to successful careers in the culinary field.

Along with Russ Tronsen, who ran the program for many years and is now Badger's principal, the culinary program is the most awarded in the state.

"I love working with Badger because they get so much confidence," Bogan said. "They won't even know how much they learned until they get out in the work field." We're handed aprons and our own chef's hat, which is, appropriately, much smaller than Bogan's.

After washing our hands, we gather together in the kitchen. Bogan holds court, explaining that cooking starts with the best food bought from area merchants. And, he jokes, that the seafood — even the lobster — comes from the waters of Geneva Lake.

Our job is to create a four-course dinner composed of seared salmon au poivre with colossal shrimp scampi garni, black truffle onion soup, and rack of lamb with whipped potatoes and, of course, dessert.

We're at a large table in the big and roomy well-equipped kitchen where each of us receives a different part of the menu to prepare. As we start cooking, we're served smoked Gouda gougéres, a French-style cheese puff, to whet our appetites.

In such close quarters you can't help but talk to the person next to you and we share years of living. The couple next to



us found love later in life. We exchange stories about children and grandchildren and work.

At another station, a group of kids part of a family of 14 — are assigned the dessert, a Grand Marnier dark chocolate mousse. The family had been here before, returning for the fun and food and being together.

The meal-making takes place under the watchful eye of Bogan, and his assistants who are always willing to answer questions. When Bogan shows us how to



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properly slice and dice some fresh herbs and we try to be too exact with the measurements, he picks up a portion between his fingers and deems it exact enough. "That's how grandmother used to do it," he says confirming that cooking is an art as much a science.

#### BREAKING BREAD TOGETHER

Bogan insists that a meal is a communal activity best served with family and friends. "The breaking of bread" together being as old as cooking itself. As for the TV and party-like atmosphere, Bogan says, "I teach the cooking like you cook at home."

When the meal is prepared, we gather in the dining room. The family of 14 sit at one long table. There are ten of us at another.

We sit with two women, who are longtime friends, who worked together in New Guinea. They regale us with stories of warring factions on either side of their compound who greeted the women as they went off to fight each other.

Each group is asked to step into the kitchen, fill each plate with the food they prepared and serve the guests "from the left" as instructed by Bogan.

Before each item is served, two members of the team are asked to name and describe the dish they created. At the end of the explanation, Bogan points to a sign on the wall. "What does it say?" he asks, and the presenter answers "Bon Appétit!"

A prize is traditionally given to the best dish of the night. On this night, Bogan takes the prerogative of naming us all winners.

And on this particular evening, long before spring, before the end of winter is in sight, there's a chill in the air. We're celebrating New Year's Eve with party hats and noise-makers and, of course, sparking wine. It is a few days before the actual event, not unlike the season that is almost upon us. But at the Lake Geneva School of Cooking, there's always an excuse for a party.

## **BOGAN AND** THE BURGER THROWDOWN

Bogan assists with organizing the Annual Burger Throwdown which is a competition between area chefs to see who can make the best hamburger.

The seventh annual event will take place from 12:30 - 3 p.m. Sunday, April 22, at the Ridge Hotel, W4240 Hwy. 50, Lake Geneva.

Samples are served from more than a dozen area restaurants. Participants then vote on which restaurant had the best burger. Proceeds go to the Badger Culinary ProStart Program.

General admission for ages 6 and up is \$20 for entry at 12:30 p.m. VIP tickets, which allow you to get in an hour earlier are \$35. The entry fee includes unlimited burger samples while they last. 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
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
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# ARCHITECT OF TIMELESS GRACE

HOWARD VAN DOREN SHAW'S GENEVA LAKE HOMES STAND THE TEST OF TIME

Passengers on Lake Geneva Cruise Line's popular boat tours get a waters-edge view of some of the most opulent homes in Wisconsin, and nearly everyone comes away with a favorite. For those who appreciate historic estates with a genteel classical influence, the Lake Geneva homes designed by the Chicago architect Howard Van Doren Shaw may prove to be the ones that truly steal their hearts.

Shaw's designs date to the first quarter of the 20th century, and yet they have unquestionably stood the test of time. The homes he designed on Geneva Lake for wealthy Chicagoans have remained remarkably resistant to the wrecking ball, despite changing tastes and the logistical challenges of transitioning an older home into the modern era. In 2015, Chicago architect Stuart Cohen of Stuart Cohen and Julie Hacker Architects wrote Inventing the New American Home, a book about Shaw's work, and he attributes this timelessness to Shaw's design sensibility. "The period around 1900 was a period of enormous social change [in America] with the rapid growth of the American middle class," Cohen explains. "And so the kinds of houses that even very wealthy people wanted reflected a greater informality and a more relaxed lifestyle, particularly in their country homes."

#### SOCIALITE ARCHITECT OF PRAIRIE AVENUE

Howard Van Doren Shaw was born in 1869 in Chicago, making him one of the few Chicago architects of his era to claim native status. Shaw was born into the upper elite of Chicago society: his father Theodore was a successful dry goods merchant who served on the planning committee of the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition, and his mother was a Van Doren (of the prominent old New York family) and a trained painter who attended the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and exhibited her work throughout the country during her lifetime. Shaw grew up on Calumet Avenue in the fashionable Prairie Avenue District, and attended the Harvard School for Boys in Hyde Park before heading to the East Coast to attend college at Yale University.

Following his graduation from Yale in 1890, Shaw enrolled at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, one of the few schools in the country at the time to offer a degree in architecture. The program at MIT emphasized the aesthetic of the Ecoles Des Beaux-Arts, an influential Parisian school which favors classical arts and architecture from Ancient Greek and Roman influences. Shaw's designs

demonstrated this training throughout his career. However, Cohen feels Shaw was able to transcend his classical influences to create something new in home design. "Shaw was happy to work with traditional forms," he explains. "But one of the arguments that I make in my book is that while Shaw never tried to invent a new vocabulary of architecture, he was part of a group of architects who were in fact transforming the American house."

After receiving his architecture degree, Shaw traveled extensively in Europe, where he was greatly influenced by the new Arts and Crafts movement emerging from England, particularly the work of architect Edwin Lutyens. Although Shaw's own summer home in Lake Forest demonstrated his clear preference for the English Arts and Crafts style, his exceptional training allowed him to excel in a variety of architectural styles, as dictated by the preference of the client. Shaw apprenticed with venerable Chicago architecture firm Jenney and Mundie before establishing his own firm in 1894.

During his more than three decades of work, Shaw proved to be an extremely prolific architect, working on residential, commercial and civic projects. Before he passed away in 1926, the American Institute of Architects awarded Shaw a Gold Medal, its highest award, recognizing him for his exemplary achievements in architectural design. Unfortunately, following Shaw's death, many of his office files were lost and no complete record of his work exists to this day. Historians like Cohen have worked to assemble records from homeowners, collaborators and museum collections to create as comprehensive a list of Shaw's work as possible. Based on this research, we know that Shaw designed at least six homes on Geneva Lake, five of which still stand today. (Hubbard Carpenter's Rehoboth has been demolished.)

#### SHAW'S FIRST LAKE GENEVA COMMISSION: ALOHA LODGE

At the turn of the 20th century, Tracy C. Drake of the prominent Chicago hotelier family hired Shaw to design a country home on Geneva Lake's South Shore for him to enjoy with his wife, Annie Daughaday Drake, and their two young sons. Drake requested a Southern Colonial-inspired home from Shaw, which he named Aloha

House in the Woods on the north shore of Geneva Lake is defined by large arched bay windows on the front of the house and the use of triple archways that would appear on subsequent homes Shaw designed around the lake. The U-shaped home was designed with a terrace and courtyard at the rear of house, creating a welcoming entrance for guests.

Lodge after the family returned from a formative trip to Hawaii where they befriended the deposed Queen Liliuokalani. A large veranda facing the lake was supported by imposing, 25-foot-tall Ionic columns, demonstrating Shaw's Beaux-Arts training, though the overall effect of the home is described in a 1939 *Chicago Tribune* article as "pure American in type."

Inside, Shaw's signature open-plan design surprised the article's author, who remarked, "In the lodge, no space has been wasted on halls or walls. One enters the wide door... and comes directly into the large living room, 24 feet wide by 44 feet long. Across the room from the carriage driveway door is another door, a long glass door that opens upon the wide veranda." The article goes on to praise everything from the Colonial-style fireplace to the mahogany balustrade on the staircase. The semicircular dining

room ("a charming room") featured white paneled walls and French windows that also opened on to the veranda.

Shaw was famous for demanding topquality workmanship in all of the homes he designed. Although he was not a trained craftsman himself, he acquired enough on-the-job knowledge of masonry, roofing, carpentry and painting that he would occasionally pick up tools and do the work himself during the construction of his homes. "There are stories about Shaw telling workmen on his jobs to rip out work that he found unacceptable," explains Cohen. "Even to extent of taking tools away from workmen and saying, 'That's not how you do it, let me show you.' Shaw built very solid homes."

#### HOUSE IN THE WOODS


In 1905 (around the same time he was designing Hubbard Carpenter's Rehoboth on the north side of Geneva Bay), Shaw designed another elegant summer home for Geneva Lake. Chicago businessman and Director of the University of Chicago Adolphus Clay Bartlett commissioned an architecturally unique home he named House in the Woods. Bartlett's son Frederic Clay Bartlett, an accomplished painter and muralist, collaborated closely with Shaw to design what Clay later explained was a whimsical take on country living.



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("Most people take their country house entirely too seriously," he told a reporter for *Country Life in America*.)

House in the Woods included a painting studio for Frederic Clay Bartlett, separated from the main residence by a loggia, a terrace and a courtyard containing a fountain and an original Clay mural. According to Cohen, the detailing of both buildings particularly the trellising of the walls - was reminiscent of the Viennese Secessionist movement and combined elements of the Arts and Crafts and Art Nouveau movements. At House in the Woods, Shaw made liberal use of the triple archways that would appear on subsequent homes he designed on Geneva Lake. The front of the house was defined by arched bay windows in the living and dining room.

Cohen particularly admires the way the home's original design created a sense of drama for the arriving guest. "You used to drive through the woods and come to a turnaround in front of the house... and you walked through a big entryway, and the entrance to the house was in that covered space," he explains. "On the other side you had a wall with three sets of French doors that opened to a hallway... which then opened to a screened porch/ loggia. So instead of walking in and seeing straight to the lake, you'd have an entry sequence that carefully... channeled the views out to the lake."

#### **VILLA HORTENSIA**

The following year, Edward Foster Swift, son of meatpacking scion Gustavus Swift, commissioned Shaw to design his country home on the north shore of Geneva Lake. Villa Hortensia, named in honor of Swift's wife Hortense, bore a slight resemblance to House in the Woods, though in his book, Cohen describes Villa Hortensia as "vaguely Mediterranean [in] style" with Arts and Crafts details "on a grander scale."

The driveway entrance featured a covered entry porch with three arched doors supported by classical Doric columns. Shaw repeated this arrangement on the lake façade in the three arched French doors leading to the front patio and the lawn and lake beyond, a connection between the house and the landscape that was a hallmark of Shaw's designs. Shaw collaborated with famed landscape

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The grand, forty-room home known as Villa Hortensia was built for Edward Swift, of the Swift meatpacking company. Although the home has had many owners since being built in 1906, its façade has remained relatively unchanged.

architect Jens Jensen on several projects, including Villa Hortensia, ensuring that the home's interior spaces would flow easily into the landscape. The front patio ran the entire length of the house and provided the liminal space between the inside and the outside. According to Cohen, the design of Villa Hortensia "is an idea about connecting the house to the landscape that's often linked to the Prairie School, but Shaw was doing it with a different set of architectural forms. The connection of



inside to outside was something that Shaw felt very strongly about."

Inside, Shaw's design for Villa Hortensia included a large vaulted gallery, a guest suite, a spacious sunken living room, a reception hall with a fountain and ceramic pool, and a circular staircase to the second floor gallery and bedrooms, among many other elegant aspects.

#### ALTA VISTA

It would be more than a decade before Shaw designed another home on Geneva Lake. In 1919, Colonel William Nelson Pelouze and his wife purchased Alta Vista on Geneva Lake's north shore, but they only spent one summer in the grand Victorian-style home before it burned to the ground that fall. Pelouze and his wife Helen wasted no time in hiring Shaw to design its replacement. Of all of Shaw's homes on Geneva Lake, Alta Vista perhaps best demonstrates Shaw's European training. A *Chicago Tribune* article from 1939 described the home as "similar to

those surrounding many Italian lakes."

Like House in the Woods, Shaw put careful thought into the approach to the house from the road. A circular Italian-style garden containing carefully manicured hedges and evergreens, marble benches and balustrades, and a fountain and fish pool welcomed guests to the entry. On the inside of the home, Shaw designed a vaulted loggia running the entire length of the home on the lake side. Small, Italian-style balconies adorned the windows of the second-floor bedrooms.

The current homeowners bought Alta Vista more than 15 years ago and say that Shaw's design is what initially drew them to the house. "We loved that every bedroom has a view of the lake, and that [the home] was open-floor-plan before open-floor-plan was even a thing," explains the wife. "We love that we can be in the kitchen and see kids playing in the family room and everybody still feels like they're part of the same house and party."

#### ALLEGHENY

Just a few years before his death at the age of 57, Shaw completed what would turn out to be his final commission on Geneva Lake. In the late 1910s, Lewis E. Myers purchased a portion of the massive former Loramoor estate and in 1924 he built Allegheny, named for his birthplace near Pittsburgh. Allegheny was a Shaw-designed Colonial home remarkably similar in appearance to Shaw's first Geneva Lake commission, Aloha Lodge. Myers owned a Chicago

construction firm and served as president of the Southern Electric Company, which provided electricity to the Lake Geneva area from 1916 to 1929 before being purchased by Wisconsin Power and Light. He was also an avid orchidist, and raised hundreds of varieties of the exotic flowers in his greenhouses on the property.

Like all of Shaw's homes on Geneva Lake. Allegheny's design featured a massive open living room at the center of the house. A 1943 Chicago Tribune article estimated it to be 60 feet by 35 feet, and described the room's French doors leading to the pillared portico on the front of the house, "giving a vista of the lawn and lake that at first sight seems to be part of the room." The refined, traditional living room ---complete with painted mural wallpaper - contrasted with the informality of the wood-paneled card room next to it. The formal dining room featured arched built-in bookcases flanking another set of French doors.

Cohen points out that the style of both Aloha Lodge and Allegheny were unusual for Shaw. "The Colonial houses with the colonnaded porches, those houses are totally atypical of Shaw's work," he explains. In fact, when looking at the body of Shaw's work, most of the homes he designed on Geneva Lake demonstrate a divergence from Shaw's personal preferences and suggest significant input from their owners. But as Cohen points out, "Shaw was very a popular architect and I assume he got that way by pleasing clients."

#### SHAW'S HOMES TODAY

Although most have been altered slightly, all five of Shaw's homes that remain on Geneva Lake today are still under private ownership, enjoyed by a new generation of families who choose to spend their summers here. The timeless grace of these homes ensures that they are still admired by the area's tourists, and their continued presence connects the history of the early 20th century to the modern Lake Geneva of today. This is due in no small part to the sensibility of their architect, Howard Van Doren Shaw. "There was a sense of scale to [Shaw's houses]," Cohen says. "Even the grand houses had a sense of comfort and intimacy that you don't get in any of the really big, palatial places of the era. Shaw's houses just felt comfortable."



## Walking in History's FOOTSTEPS

The Geneva Lake Shore Path, especially when the weather begins to warm and the smell of freshly cut grass hangs in the air, has a timeless feel about it. Along the water's edge, its landmarks, whether a familiar footbridge, limestone walkway or hundred-year-old-oak greet those who pass year after year.

For generations, as springtime emerges, hikers begin to reappear on the path. On one side, Geneva Lake's crystal clear waters shimmer in the sunshine; on the other, manicured lawns and gardens meet stately mansions and lake homes.

There are those who are in deep thought, hiking to find solitude and peace. Others walk in groups and are in animated conversation as their voices echo across the lake. But all seem to understand one thing: this ancient path is a window to the past. Some stop for a moment to reflect, some perhaps to consider who came before them on this journey around the lake.

It's believed as early as 2500 BC, the lakeside path was used by Native American tribes. The Potawatomi, who, until 1836, lived along Geneva Lake — then known as Kishwauketoe, traversed the path from their villages near present-day Fontana, Williams Bay and Lake Geneva. The shoreline of Geneva Lake, however, soon began to change after the Great Chicago Fire in 1871. The grand and historic estates, some of which still stand, were built by some of the most influential Chicago families, and the shore path became the route used by those working at these "summer cottages."

As remarkable as it seems, early settlers recognized the importance of this age-old trail and ensured that 20 feet from the shoreline should be preserved as public domain. This alone makes the path unique, but another aspect, the requirement by landowners to maintain the path through their properties guarantees hikers will have a clear walkway and vistas of unmatched beauty.

The Path's 21.5 miles takes most eight to 10 hours to walk, but many have favorite segments that don't require as much commitment of time and energy — Lake Geneva to Chapin Road, Williams Bay to Fontana, Shadow Lane to Big Foot Beach, or places in between. Whatever portion they choose, hikers recognize the rare nature of this public access lakeshore path that is centuries-old, yet discovered anew each spring.

## EAST TROY ELECTRIC RAILROAD SERVES UP PIZZA AND SO MUCH MORE

I'm not sure what's more exciting for a child: a train ride with a pizza and soda, or the ice cream cone promised afterwards. My daughters, ages 10 and nine, eagerly jumped in the car one Saturday afternoon in May for the 20-minute drive from Lake Geneva to the East Troy Electric Railroad. My husband and I had never visited the railroad before, or downtown East Troy, so this was a new experience for our entire family.

We arrived with ample time to explore the depot before the Pizza Train was scheduled to depart. The historic East Troy Electric Railroad depot consists of a ticketing area, small museum and green space outside with picnic tables. The museum portion of the building offers a lot to read about local railroad history, vintage photos, memorabilia and interactive displays.

We ventured outside so we could watch the train arrive at the depot, with much fanfare from the groups ready to board and a conductor waving from outside the front car. We boarded and were directed to two tables for two on one side of the train, so that each of us had a window seat. Tables big enough for four were available on the other side of the aisle.

The conductor made announcements and our drink order was taken. Kids receive unlimited soda (if you want to go down that sugary path) and for adults, there's a bar service. The train started its journey right away, chugging along through the greenery of rural Wisconsin.

Dinner included garlic knot rolls, which were delicious, and a pizza for each table (several topping options are available). We were served quickly and enjoyed watching the scenery go by out the window as we ate.

A little more than a half hour into our journey, the train slowed to a stop at Byrnes Park, a pretty trackside park with a play area. Everyone got off the train and enjoyed the late spring sunshine and the playground. Many groups took photos in front of a huge lilac bush. Then the conductor signaled that it was time to hop back on for the ride home.

The East Troy Electric Railroad is the last remnant of the Milwaukee Electric Railroad & Light Company's interurban rail system, which once operated over 130 miles of track in southeastern Wisconsin.

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## **Riding the Rails**



Young and old alike — adventure seekers or railroad buffs shouldn't pass up the chance to take a trip on the East Troy Electric Railroad. The 14-mile roundtrip journey between East Troy and Mukwonago offers a glimpse of the early days of interurban rail system in Wisconsin. An all-volunteer crew operates the trains and the museum, which features 32 pieces of "rolling stock," including street cars from Milwaukee and Minneapolis, plus interurban cars from Chicago South Shore & South Bend Railroad and Sheboygan Light Power & Railway.

The railroad runs regularly scheduled trains from April through November and offers a number of fun options in addition to the pizza train. You can board the train in East Troy and take a ride to Mukwonago's Elegant Farmer, enjoy a themed dinner train, take a journey on the bunny train at Easter or board the Christmas train for a family-fun adventure.

The railroad welcomes charter trips for birthday parties or other special events, and encourages families to check out their membership opportunities. For more information visit easttroyrr.org.

On the way back to East Troy, the conductor entertained the kids by handing out coloring sheets and telling us more about the railroad and other special train rides offered during the year. He also explained that each rider receives a free ice cream cone at J. Lauber's Ice Cream Parlor located across the tracks from the depot.

I. Lauber's is a treat in itself: it's a 1920's-era old-fashioned ice cream shop with candies we recognized from our childhood and plenty of ice cream flavors to choose from. The owner, John Lauber, is one of the founders of the East Troy Electric Railroad Museum and has operated the ice cream shop for more than 40 years.

Needless to say, the kids had a hard time deciding on an ice cream flavor, but it gave the adults plenty of time to reminisce about all of the old candies on display. We enjoyed our cones outside and the girls asked if we could do it all again some time. Maybe we could try the burger train next time, we all agreed ... and definitely more ice cream.



SMALL TOWN DEPARTMENT STORES — THE HEART AND SOUL OF AREA COMMUNITIES

Bradley's Department Store has been in business for 166 years in Delavan. A large part of its early history includes the company's ownership of Bradley Knitting Co. which was one of the world's largest makers of knitted garments, including sweaters, dresses and swimsuits.

The first department store I ever entered L alone was in Winters, California, a sleepy railroad town 70 miles northeast of San Francisco, where we visited my great-grandparents on weekends. One Saturday, I skipped the grocery store and took my allowance to Greenwood's Department Store, crossing the threshold into what seemed a very grown-up place. Inside, wood floors creaked and racks of men's, women's and children's clothing towered over me. Just one story, there was nothing here my quarter could buy. Even in 1973, embroidered handkerchiefs were forty cents. Still, that didn't stop the clerk from offering me a warm greeting and I lingered because I felt welcome.

That a sales clerk would treat a sevenyear-old with the same courtesy as adult customers doesn't surprise Kelly Freeman or Lois Stritt. Both have extensive roots in small town department stores. Freeman's closed in 1996 and Stritt's is in its 166th year. Unlike the big box stores that have transformed the off-ramps of America into a sea of sameness, a small town department store's mission extends beyond a homogenized bottom line.


"We've been here since 1852," says Stritt. "Anyone who walks in becomes a friend. Our customers are our friends."



Once upon a time, small town department stores were as much a gathering place as they were a retail establishment. An anchor before the term "anchor store" was coined, their presence paved the way for other businesses in historic downtown districts.

"We had some people who came in every day. It was sort of like people who visit a library," recalls Freeman, whose grandfather started Waals Department Store in Walworth. "They feel they're at home. They know the employees and its generations after generations, who keep coming back. It was wonderful while it lasted."

What lasted for Freeman's family was impressive. Her grandfather, Myer Cohn, immigrated to America from Lithuania, where he had studied to be a rabbi. With a \$50 loan from his brother in Crystal Lake, Illinois, he sold housewares door-todoor in the Village of Walworth. By 1900, he'd saved up enough to rent a storefront. His dreams were bigger, though, and he always wanted his own store. In 1914, and after some difficulty securing backers,

he found financing from an unlikely source: Milton College.

Why would a Wisconsin college, with roots in the Seventh Day Baptist faith, back a Jewish retailer still new to America?

His granddaughter doesn't hesitate with her reply: "I guess they thought it was a good investment," says Freeman.

A good investment would be an understatement. By the time Waals Department Store closed, the regional retail icon was four years shy of the century mark.

Over in Delavan, Bradley's Department Store, which was founded in 1852 and has been in its current location since 1887, is one of the oldest, continuously operating department stores in the country. Today, it's owned and run by Stritt, a pint-sized-powerhouse who bought the store after losing her husband of 51 years, Jack, in 2010. I have interviewed Stritt many times over the years, and buy most of my husband's clothing from her. When I am in need of a simple black dress or something quietly chic, Bradley's never disappoints. Like any good business owner, she knows the names of her customers and uses them frequently when conversing.

"I love this store, Lisa," she says, seated on a chair in the center of the men's department. "I don't want to be the one who turns the lights out here. I don't have any grandchildren, so I call this my grandbaby. If I had a grandchild, I wouldn't be doing this. When my sons came home for their father's funeral, I told them 'I bought myself a grandbaby since nobody gave me one.""

As soon as she finishes that sentence, her attention focuses on a customer.

"That jacket is so cute," she offers. "Every year, Keren Hart does a new jacket. Pull it down in the back. Yes, I like it. That's nice on you." Then, because she is not a pushy saleswoman, Stritt leaves her customer in peace.

"I just love coming to work, Lisa. I just love it. I can't imagine not being here."

## WAALS — A DESTINATION FOR GENERATIONS

Kelly Freeman also loved going to work. Waals Department Store in Walworth, on the south side of the town square, was more than a beacon for customers. It was Freeman's childhood home. When Freeman was born, her grandfather, Myer, was no longer alive and her father, Sam, was running the store with her grandmother, Dora Cohn. The family lived on the top floor.

"I arrived there when I was six-weeksold," recalls Freeman. "They were very happy memories and I loved it. And our employees over the years, it was an extended family. Two of our employees worked for us for over 50 years."

At its peak, Waals covered three stories and 30,000 square feet. Early ads,

Give us a call and we'd be happy to meet with you to discuss your project. which featured the moniker Myer Cohn General Merchandise before the name was changed to Waals, boasted clothing, shoes, rugs, linoleum, groceries, furniture, wallpaper, paint and china.

"It was interesting how it worked. This was the beauty of having a department store. When one department was doing really well, another wasn't," says Freeman. "The departments carried each other."

Freeman and her husband, Richard, who assumed ownership in 1962, furthered the store's reach by tapping into the wealthy Chicagoans who summered here.

"The '70s and '80s were wonderful," Freeman says. "We largely depended on tourism and Lake Geneva is a wonderful destination. Many people who had summer homes up here, we furnished them and outfitted their children to go back to school. And we had local customers, too, through the year."

Among those loyal locals was Nancy Lehman.



"When we had Waals Department Store, my house had their carpeting, their fabrics and we had their clothing," says Lehman, a board member with the Historical Society of Walworth and Big Foot Prairie. "People came from all over Lake Geneva, Elkhorn, Harvard and other towns to shop at Waals. It was a destination."

Then came the '90s. Online commerce was in its infancy, but giving brick and mortar something to fret about. Big box stores were expanding into smaller communities. Kohl's and Walmart didn't open in Delavan until 2002 and 2003 respectively, but their interest was known.

"I have strong emotional ties to the store," Freeman says. "It was a hard decision to make, but our children were not going to be involved. And with the advent of the big box stores, we could see what was around us. So we made the decision to close. In the end, you are running a business and you have to make decisions based on that."

For a while, the building operated as an antique store. In 2015, it was torn down to widen traffic lanes around the town square — all physical traces of Waals Department Store gone forever.

#### PERSONAL SERVICE IS THEIR FORTE

Small town department stores aren't the only ones struggling today. The sun seems to be setting on large department stores, too.

In 2016, department stores had \$155.5 billion in total sales, down from \$230 billion in 1999, according to *Fortune* magazine. Economists blame too many stores, the shift to online shopping, and demands for extreme discounts.

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have half the energy Lois Stritt of Bradley's has, they might survive. In her eighth decade of life, Stritt was a homemaker for most of it. When her husband, Jack, sold his paint manufacturing business in 2002 and retired, she needed some time away from all that togetherness. So she started working at Bradley's for then-owners Bill and Diane McKoy. When the McKoys wanted to sell, she purchased the store with her husband's blessing. He died five days before she signed the final papers.

"He knew I would be OK because I'd have the store," she says.

Bradley's was founded in 1852 by William Wallace Bradley. Born in New York, Bradley apprenticed as a tailor in Kenosha. His first solo proprietorship was a men's clothing shop across from the water tower in downtown Delavan. The present-day store was built in 1887 and featured men's, women's and children's clothing, shoes, and housewares. It became wellknown for its knitted clothing.

Stritt is Bradley's fifth owner. She closed the children's department when Kohl's came to town. But even in an era when drones can drop off packages at our doorsteps, she believes Bradley's has a part to play.

"Overall, it's OK," she says of business today. "It's not like it used to be. But we have loyal customers and we offer personal service ... I still think there's a place for that."

Then, as if on cue but clearly not, a man strolls into the store and the octogenarian retailer leaps from her chair and literally runs to greet him.

"Frank!" she shouts, throwing her arms around him. "It's so good to see you."

After pleasantries are exchanged, Frank is taken under the wing of Linda Rayfield, a clerk at Bradley's for the last 37 years, and Stritt returns to her seat.

So who's Frank?

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"Oh, Frank, he's a great customer." says Stritt. "He found us not too long ago. He buys stuff for his wife here. He's such a nice man."

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
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


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# BUILDING *a Legacy*

## AN ELKHORN COMPANY IS BREATHING NEW LIFE INTO RECLAIMED MATERIALS THROUGH LOVINGLY-CRAFTED FURNITURE AND FIXTURES

**O** n a quiet piece of land 10 minutes outside of downtown Elkhorn, there's a place that absorbs inspiration from the neighboring farms that surround it. Follow a gravel driveway to a well-weathered barn, then head toward the sounds of saws hard at work and the smell of sawdust. That's where you'll find Heritage Beam and Board, a living, breathing tribute to buildings and farms of bygone eras that were constructed using old-growth, tried-and-true materials.

Seth Hanson and Emily Krauklis are the proud owners of this company that's equal parts salvage and craftsmanship. Their team painstakingly takes down storied barns and buildings piece by piece, foreseeing futures for them that lie beyond the scrap pile. The materials are transformed into beams, doors, flooring, mantels, countertops, walls and furniture, each waiting to add history and originality to homes and businesses.

Krauklis puts it well, saying, "It is an awesome thing to be able to take something old and otherwise discarded, not given the ability to get to its full potential, and we pull as much as we can out of these materials that are nonrenewable. We get as much as we can out of them, bringing joy and fun things to our customers."

Hanson echoes the sentiment. "You see this old barn and you think, 'Oh shoot, that's an old, dilapidated barn.' But you just have to spend a little time with [the materials] and you've got to treat them right. And then they'll end up treating

you right because of how unique and special they are. There's heritage in those boards and structures."

And that's how their company started.

#### CONTINUING THE STORY

With a tagline of "We Continue the Story," it's not surprising that Heritage

Beam and Board has an interesting story of their own, one that started when Hanson and his best friend Adam Krauklis met as kids. They've been inseparable ever since, sharing a passion for building and restoring.

The turning point for them was in 2009 when the two approached a farmer about

taking down his barn to salvage wood for their own home projects. Hanson was working as a general contractor, while Krauklis owned a drywall business. As the two began discovering more and more barns, they launched a full-fledged business in 2011. As the pace picked up, Hanson says that "we more or less needed to focus on the business and give it the respect due," so Hanson made the decision to go full-time. That's when Krauklis' wife Emily stepped in, taking over for Adam.

The real turning point for Emily was when the company started building furniture from salvaged materials, that's when she lightheartedly said, "I wanna play." She had been working as freelance graphic designer, creating visuals for educational publishing companies and a ministry. She also designed Heritage Beam and Board's logo.

Now as a co-owner, Krauklis calls upon her creativity and design background to consult with customers and guide the process of constructing one-of-a-kind

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fixtures and pieces. The showroom, a fascinating assemblage of found treasures—cavalcades of pulleys, vintage signs and examples of their work—is open by appointment only. To craft a custom piece, customers take part in a consultation that consists of viewing materials, sketching and brainstorming.

Once a piece is approved, it goes to production—also known as where the magic happens.

#### PIECES WITH A PAST

In a workroom where sawdust flies, furniture and installations are handcrafted from old-growth materials. Hanson clarifies this term, saying, "Old growth means trees that were left to grow naturally in their place. They grew to be nice, big trees that weren't farmed to grow as fast as possible."

Midwestern farmers and building owners call Heritage Beam and Board to demolish structures that have lived out their lives but still brim with highquality, usable materials. Wood from a barn once used as a hideout by gangster Meyer Lansky was turned into a bar and purchased by Terry Bradshaw, former NFL quarterback and longtime TV sports analyst. Waals Department Store was gleaned of its floor joists, which now reside in booths at Harpoon Willies in Williams Bay. The materials of old barns have found their way into wine cellars, great rooms and businesses from Lake Geneva to Chicago.

Hanson says, "Instead of growing a new tree and cutting it down as fast as possible to grow another, we're utilizing beams and boards and all kinds of fun




things that represent old-growth forests from up north. We're talking 300-yearold trees that were cut and made into beams and stood for 150 years as a barn."

He also loves that each piece of material has a story to tell. "The material has markings on it from hoof marks or whatever it went through. Each board has a story. Utilizing new materials is fine, too, but boy, what a unique thing it is that each board has the story that it has. You can bang up new wood [to make it look old], but it's just banged-up wood."

#### A FAMILY FOUNDATION

While Heritage Beam and Board decidedly has its roots in the past and historic materials, it's equally rooted in the importance of family.


As Krauklis and Hanson look at the future of their business, they see growth, even to the point of moving into a new location, located less than a mile from their current facility.

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

Pollard, whose grandfather was born in Lake Geneva in 1896, sees value in making a home here. He spent summers in the area with dreams of someday moving, and he finally made that happen in 1993, with the founding of FairWyn the same year.




However, one unique component of the 1960s Whitewater home was a "breezeway" from the garage entrance. Brugger suggested opening that space by incorporating it into the kitchen.



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
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RESEARCH SUPPORTS ADDING EGGS TO YOUR DIET IS A GOOD THING

Sometimes you wonder why it takes so long to get things straight. In 1961, the FDA announced that excess cholesterol in the bloodstream was a health hazard. The scientists and nutritionists then, by extrapolation, said that we had better stop eating things with high levels of cholesterol. The consumption of eggs, which have a large amount of cholesterol, fell by 30 percent in the U.S. Farmers suffered and, health wise, we all suffered for no good reason.

By 2015, the data showed something very interesting. Your body, as you probably know, makes cholesterol. The studies showed that if you reduce the intake of dietary cholesterol, your body increases production. If you increase consumption, the body makes less. The human body seeks a certain level of cholesterol and what you eat has little to do with it. Holy cow, the farmers have been taking it in the ear for 54 years; half of us have been eating egg white omelets, and now they tell us "Oops!" The 2015 FDA Food Guidelines rectified the problem and stated that dietary cholesterol is "not considered a nutrient of concern."

So, it's now time to revisit eggs, which are truly a superfood. First, they are a dieter's friend. Two eggs are a mere 150 calories. Add a piece of buttered toast, a cup of coffee and you have a great breakfast with only 250 calories. Secondly, they have a lot of protein — 7 grams per egg, which is more than most "protein bars" and equal to meat or fish on a calorie for calorie basis. Eggs are also loaded with vitamins and nutrients. They even have a "secret weapon" to help

## Good vs. Bad Fats: What You Need to Know

The human body cannot make two types of Essential Fatty Acids or EFAs, which are called, in shorthand, Omega-3 and Omega-6. These EFAs are needed by the body to produce a host of enzymes and proteins. We would die without these fats. Good levels of Omega 3 fats have been shown to help regulate blood pressure, lower cholesterol, improve mood and brain function and even boost immunity, to mention a few of its health benefits. However, modern diets are generally deficient in Omega-3 fats and contain an excess of Omega-6 fats. The excess of Omega-6 fats is associated with a host of health problems including arthritis, inflammation, and cancer. Generally, we should be increasing Omega-3 fats in our diet and decreasing Omega-6 fats. Good sources of Omega-3 are eggs, fish oil, salmon, grass-fed beef, sardines and walnuts.

with weight loss: eggs contain Leucine, an amino acid which helps you maintain muscle mass when dieting. Finally, they are inexpensive — anywhere from \$0.20 to \$0.40 each.

Eggs are also now healthier for you as producers change to higher quality feed to get eggs with a higher level of Omega-3 fats (the good guys) and less Omega-6 fats (the bad guys). If you feed flax seed to chickens, they double the production of Omega-3 fats, so look for the eggs that say Omega-3 on the carton.

#### EASY WAYS TO ENJOY EGGS

**Scrambled eggs:** Go back to the old standard. Skip the bacon, sausage and potatoes.

Whisk the eggs and add the salt and pepper before cooking. Don't add milk. Melt a little butter in a hot pan, add the eggs. Remove the pan from the heat while the eggs are still wet and let them finish cooking but not get too dry. If you want to be more ambitious, sauté some onion and red pepper and add them to the eggs. Needless to say, this can also lead you into omelets and frittatas.

**Eggy Pancake Batter:** You can double or triple the amount of eggs in a pancake recipe and the results are more like crepes, and more nutritious. This is a good way to get the kids to eat more eggs. As long as they get butter and syrup on top, they don't care.

**Breakfast casserole:** Make this the night before when you have a group to feed. It is wonderful and easy and it serves 8-12.

#### Ingredients:

12 eggs
8 cups (one large loaf) challah or egg bread, cut into <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-inch cubes.
1 lb. ham (thickly sliced), diced
3 cups whole milk
2 cups grated Gruyère cheese (about 8 oz.)
3 Tbsp. olive oil
3 onions, thinly sliced
1 tsp. salt
½ tsp. sugar
1 tsp. freshly grated nutmeg
4 tsp. fresh thyme leaves

#### **Directions:**

1. Grease a large 10" x 14" baking dish and add the cubed challah.

2. Heat the olive oil in a skillet over medium to low heat. Add the onions, salt, and sugar. Sauté until they are lightly caramelized (a medium goldenbrown color), about 15 minutes.

3. Add the ham and cook about 5 minutes

4. Whisk together the eggs, milk, dry mustard, nutmeg, and thyme. Season with salt and pepper.

5. Sprinkle onion and ham over the bread cubes. Sprinkle grated Gruyère on top, and then pour the egg mixture over the entire thing.

6. Press down on the top gently with a spatula, so that all the bread cubes get soaked with the egg mixture. Cover and refrigerate overnight.

7. In the morning, preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Take the casserole out of

the fridge while the oven is preheating. Bake, uncovered, for 30-35 minutes, or until the edges are bubbling and the top begins to brown.

If you are hosting brunch, serve with a green salad, some asparagus, and a tall V-8 or Bloody Mary. Cut the recipe in half for a smaller group and use an 8" x 8" pan.

#### DEVILED EGGS: THE GO-TO APPETIZER

You'll never go wrong with deviled eggs for cocktail hour or for a party where you want to show off your culinary skills. There are endless variations. To start, boil six eggs for 10 minutes, cool in cold water, peel under running water and cut in half lengthwise. Carefully extract the yolks and mash together in a mixing bowl with two tablespoons of olive oil. You are now ready to get creative.

You can basically add anything you like to the mixture. Here is one of my favorites from the great Marcella Hazan:

Green Eggs: Start with the yolks and olive oil as described above and add the



following ingredients:

#### Ingredients:

- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Tbsp. capers drained and washed
- 1 Tbsp. chopped parsley 3 anchovy filets – washed and finely
- chopped
- $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. garlic finely chopped
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp. Dijon mustard
- 1 pinch of salt
- 2 Tbsp. red pepper finely chopped

#### Directions:

1. Mix all the ingredients except the red pepper and spoon back into the whites.

2. Garnish with the red pepper.

**Avocado Eggs:** Add the following to the yolks and olive oil:

#### Ingredients:

- 1 ripe avocado diced
- 2 Tbsp. lime juice
- 1 Tbsp. jalapeño pepper seeded and finely diced
- 3 Tbsp. fresh cilantro finely chopped
- 2 Tbsp. red pepper finely chopped

#### Directions:

Mix all the ingredients except the red pepper and spoon back into the whites. Garnish with the red pepper.

**Dollop Eggs:** Add these ingredients to the yolk and olive oil mixture.

#### Ingredients:

Pinch of salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp. finely chopped garlic

#### Directions:

Mix well and spoon back into the whites. Now you can simply add a dollop of some exotic ingredient and serve. Some of my favorites are chutney, caviar, bacon bits or mint jelly. Let yourself go wild!





## Holistic Healing and Prevention

#### HOW ACUPUNCTURE RESTORES BALANCE TO YOUR BODY AND MIND

Cindy Campbell, owner and practitioner at the Acupuncture Wellness Center in Lake Geneva, has a friend who suffered from asthma, which would hospitalize her regularly. She started acupuncture treatments and was able to stop most of her medications, to the point of only using an inhaler as needed. "Then she recognized how it helped her with stress, she was sleeping better, her digestion was better, so she just continued on," Campbell notes. Brandon LaGreca, owner of East Troy Acupuncture has numerous patient success stories as well, and points to the long history of this form of holistic healing. LaGreca says that formal Chinese medicine has been in practice for more than 3,000 years and the use of acupuncture may be even older.

Campbell says education is key to helping the community understand that the heart of the acupuncture model is about health prevention. She truly believes people need both Western and Eastern medicinal approaches. "But if you look at the first model, it's doesn't work unless you're sick," she says. "Eastern medicine focuses on keeping people well. In ancient China, if acupuncturists detected a slight shift in their patients' energy systems, that person was to be treated immediately. The whole theory of this medicine is based on prevention."

LaGreca agrees. "Chinese medicine uses a variety of techniques that restore balance to the body, mind, and emotions," he adds. "The therapies used are individualized, addressing the root cause of disease instead of suppressing symptoms."

It does this by releasing endorphins, which make patients feel good, says Campbell. Acupuncture also releases the natural opiates of the body that reduce pain, and releases neurotransmitters affecting the central nervous system. This in turn, boosts a person's immune system.

"Acupuncture works whether or not you think it will," LaGreca adds. "Acupuncture is used successfully on animals and children. They do not understand or believe in the process, yet they often get better results than adults. A positive attitude helps with any type of therapy."

#### ACUPUNCTURE 101

"Acupuncture improves the body's functions and really promotes the natural, self-healing process," Campbell continues. She says the practice does this by stimulating specific anatomical sites, the acupuncture points, which are located on a grid system of energy. These energy points can become blocked through illness or stress, trauma or disease.

"When the energy is blocked, that's where

the disease process starts," she adds.

Each energy pathway through the body (meridian), correlates with an organ. There are 14 meridians in the human body, which run along the arms, hands, feet, legs and torso, then connect with the organs. Campbell explains the overall health goal for anyone is achieving a balance within that entire system.

She says that many Americans are multitaskers and live lifestyles not designed for optimal health. "Here in the U.S., the liver meridian will generally be unbalanced, but in other countries, you would not see that pattern," Campbell notes.

LaGreca explains that the acupuncture pins are small, hair-thin and made from surgical stainless steel. They're not hollow as other medical needles are, and only used once, eliminating the risk of infection.

When asked, "Does it hurt?" LaGreca offers these thoughts:

"People experience acupuncture differently," he says. "Performed by a well-trained practitioner, acupuncture is rarely described as painful. Once the pins are inserted they may be manipulated to obtain a mild Qi sensation, often described as warm, heavy or achy."

Campbell agrees, saying that patients may feel a quick pinch, heat or itching or pressure at the site of the needle.

LaGreca explains that the pins remain in place for 15 to 45 minutes, depending on the treatment and the patient's comfort level. Often, this is a very relaxed time for an acupuncture patient and they fall asleep.

He says patients generally begin to feel the benefits of acupuncture treatments in two to three visits. With acute problems, significant improvement can be seen in just one, and may require only three to five treatments to fully resolve the issue. Chronic health issues will take longer to see lasting results.


Campbell says she wants patients to feel some level of shift on day one, so they will walk out and feel that they have hope through the acupuncture treatments. "I'm always honest with people," she adds. "This isn't going to be a one-time shot. Sometimes we're lucky, but for the most part it will take a series of sessions."

## WHO BENEFITS FROM ACUPUNCTURE?

Women with hormonal, menstrual or fertility issues are now looking to acupuncture for help. "If women are doing IVF [in vitro fertilization], they really love acupuncture because it supports that, as well as increases the chances of a positive IVF outcome," says Campbell.

She adds that back pain, sciatica issues as well as headaches, hypertension and knee pain are common reasons people will come for an acupuncture treatment. Both she and LaGreca have a list of common ailments they treat with acupuncture, as well as success stories on their websites. Campbell's is acupuncture4allages.com, while LaGreca's is easttroyacupuncture.com.

Campbell says that maintenance acupuncture treatments are very common, where someone comes regularly for a tune up. "They love it," Campbell says. "The comment I get a lot from people is they



don't get sick. They don't get the flu. They don't get colds. They love it and it's worth it to them to just stay with that protocol."

At East Troy Acupuncture, LaGreca offers what he calls a "community clinic" model of treatment, which is available after a patient's original treatment. He says this offers affordable, individualized care in a group setting, and is an ideal way to treat pain and stress on a maintenance basis. "Patients are encouraged to pay what they can afford within a fee range, and budget themselves for a series of treatments," he explains. "Aside from the catch of having to be treated alongside other people, the benefits of accessibility far outweigh the occasional snoring patient."

#### WEIGHING THE OUT-OF-POCKET COSTS

The United States has the highest healthcare spending at 17 percent of its gross domestic product, nearly twice as much as other developed countries, explains LaGreca. "Given the current economic climate, we need to ask some difficult questions to evaluate whether our chosen system to deliver healthcare provides value, equity, and compassionate care to all recipients."

Campbell agrees wholeheartedly. She says while insurance companies are beginning to recognize acupuncture more, the cost is still mostly out-ofpocket for patients. She believes that once Medicare recognizes acupuncture on its list of covered benefits, a big shift will begin with other companies and plans. Until then, she strives to help people understand the preventative benefits of this natural healing method.

Both of these acupuncture professionals have a common goal: improve the overall health for their communities, and know that it can only begin with a personal choice. "Any time your body takes a big hit, it weakens and begins a horrible pattern. If you can prevent it, to me that would be worth everything," says Campbell. "I always tell people that you'll take care of your car and keep it running. We have one body! Acupuncture helps you take care of it."

"What we can do is make individual choices that bring that vision, and therefore that world, into being," concludes LaGreca. "The change must begin within our collective consciousness. For my part, I wake up every day knowing that I am taking an active role in making holistic healthcare accessible to as wide a segment of the population as I can."

## Dental Care

SEAL-A-SMILE PROGRAM BRINGS DENTAL HEALTH SERVICES TO STUDENTS IN THEIR SCHOOLS

Taking care of your teeth and gums isn't just important for a healthy mouth and welcoming smile; more and more research suggests that the health of one's mouth mirrors their overall health. For instance, research indicates that keeping your mouth, teeth and gums healthy can help decrease your chance of serious medical issues down the road, including heart attack, stroke and diabetes.

Though these may seem like far-off issues, especially for school-aged children, the work of keeping your mouth healthy starts early. Two easy yet effective ways to help children maintain their oral health is with the use of sealants and the application of fluoride. And while these are a reliable and effective line of defense in the fight for oral health, these preventative treatments are out of reach for many families who don't have access to dental care or have limited dental insurance. But not in Walworth County, which participates in the Seal-A-Smile program.

A collaborative effort between Children's Health Alliance of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Department of Health Services and Delta Dental of Wisconsin, the Seal-A-Smile program provides oral health education, screening, sealant placement and fluoride varnish application free of charge to elementary school students. For almost 10 years, the Walworth County Public Health Department has partnered with Registered Dental Hygienists to bring these services to county schools.

"This program is so important for our students and families," says Chiper Tennessen, principal of Star Center Elementary School in Lake Geneva. "Many would not have access to these kinds of dental care services without Seal-A-Smile."

Adds Laurie Knepper, a health aide at the school: "The program has definitely helped our students. I see fewer coming in now with mouth or teeth pain, which can affect how they eat, sleep and perform in school. It really is a great program."

### A FIRST DENTAL EXPERIENCE

Tooth decay is one of the most common health problems in children. Kids are drinking more sugary beverages, and the sugar and acid in these drinks can break down tooth enamel and form cavities. Because it is difficult for toothbrushes to reach the back teeth, plaque and food can hide in the teeth's grooves, causing decay.

Thankfully, tooth decay is preventable thanks to sealants, which help keep plaque and food out of the teeth's grooves, and fluoride, which helps prevent early decay. Sealants and fluoride offer a one-two punch by keeping teeth healthy

and strong while preventing the need for unnecessary fillings and other dental procedures. In fact, according to Oral Health America, approximately 75 percent of teeth sealed remain cavity free. By comparison, less than one-third of teeth that are not sealed remain free of cavities.

In Walworth County, the Seal-A-Smile program serves children in 4- and 5-year-old kindergarten, second grade and fifth grade, with retention appointments for students in third and sixth grade, explains Chase Wolff, RDH, a registered dental hygienist and the county's coordinator for the program.

Because most students don't yet have their permanent molars, children in pre-kindergarten and kindergarten who participate in the program receive a screening and fluoride treatment.

Through the course of the program, children receive two fluoride treatments, which is especially important for students in Walworth County. "Very few of the municipal water systems have community fluoridated water," says Erica Bergstrom, Walworth County public health officer. "These fluoride supplements are really able to help protect teeth."

For those few kindergartners who may have their molars, says Wolff, sealants are applied, but certainly by the secondgrade visit, students receive sealants on their first molars. In fifth grade, students whose second molars have come in receive another sealant treatment on their new molars.

Education is another important piece of the program. "We do chairside education with each child," says Wolff. "We use a disclosing solution and give brushing instructions. Each student goes home with a toothbrush, toothpaste, information on why baby teeth are important, sugary drinks and preventing decay, and general information on sealants and the benefits of them."

"For many, the Seal-a-Smile program is their first dental experience," says Wendy Zimmerman, MSN, BSN, RN, CSN, Elkhorn Area School District nurse/supervisor. "They climb into the portable dental chair and are amazed they can see the plaque after the dye is applied. They learn the toothpaste isn't magical, but the toothbrush is. They watch in the mirror as the plaque disappears when they make tiny circles with their free toothbrush. Many of the



students will dress up for the day of the visit and almost all say "thank you" to the registered dental hygienist."

Teeth cleaning is not provided as part of the Seal-

A-Smile program, and children who are found to need further dental care are referred to area dental clinics.

### A COMMUNITY NEED

The need for an oral care program in the county was identified nearly 10 years ago by Zimmerman as she was working on a capstone project for her master's degree. Through annual health screenings, she found many children had dental issues and began seeking ways to address this local health concern. Then she found the state's Seal-A-Smile program.

"Initially, the program involved a significant amount of time reaching out to parents to explain the program," says Zimmerman. "Parents needed reassurance a registered dental hygienist would be performing the educational program and they wanted to make sure there were no hidden fees. Today, we have parents calling the school to make sure their children are able to participate and thanking us for having the program in the school."

From a pilot program serving 107

students in two Elkhorn schools during the 2009-2010 school year, Walworth County's Seal-A-Smile program has grown substantially, now serving 27 schools and nearly 3,000 participants. It is available to schools with 35 percent or higher participation in the free and reduced meal program, with all students in qualifying schools eligible to participate.

Not only did Zimmerman identify inschool dental care services as a critical need for the county, but improved dental health has long been— and continues to be — a priority of the Walworth County Public Health Department as well.

"Dental health continues to be a huge priority in our community," says Bergstrom. "Every five years, Public Health conducts a community health assessment, and it continues to show the county is underserved per population. We have about 2,000 residents for every dentist and many people, of all ages, are going without basic dental care."

"The Seal-a-Smile program is important

for Walworth County because it is a dental education program that improves the health and well-being of the whole family," says Zimmerman. "Many families have sought out a dentist to call their 'own' after their child returned home and shared what they learned from the registered dental hygienist. They are teaching their parents, grandparents and younger siblings that healthy teeth mean healthier bodies and that a dental chair isn't scary."

"Healthy teeth improve one's appearance, speech, breath, and total body health," Zimmerman adds. "Let's be honest: If you have dental decay, bad breath, and are frequently ill it is harder to obtain and keep a job. The Seal-a-Smile program, along with routine dental visits, promotes healthier and more employable people and that is good for everyone."






