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


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

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LAKE GENEVA HOUSE OF MUSIC KICKS OFF SEASON AT NEW AMPHITHEATER

Lake Geneva House of Music (LGHOM) owner Chris Buttleman has worked on world tours with bands such as the Eagles, the Beach Boys, Ozzy Osbourne and Elton John, but about 20 years ago he decided to stop traveling, settle down and plant some roots. Since opening the LGHOM, Buttleman has expanded the business to include a music school; a live concert and entertainment space; a music-themed café, coffeehouse and bar; and live event production services.

His newest addition to the LGHOM property on County Highway H near Lake Como is the CJB Amphitheater, an outdoor music venue which seats about 500 people. Buttleman says that he has long envisioned opening an amphitheater and hosting a summer concert series similar to the famous Ravinia Festival in Highland Park, Illinois. "I tell people I'm just getting started," Buttleman explains. "I'm ambitious." Buttleman says he hopes the new amphitheater fills an entertainment need in the community. "It's an amazing attraction with great

food, a great atmosphere, entertainment, convenient and free parking."

The amphitheater officially hosted its first concert in 2019 on a mobile stage, but 2021 marks its first full season following a pause due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Buttleman says it's refreshing to see people out and enjoying live entertainment again, noting it "feels wonderful" after his business was greatly impacted by the shutdown.

This year's schedule of entertainment included a number of tribute bands, including tributes to The Who, AC/ DC, Queen and Toby Keith. After years of booking shows, Buttleman says he tries to maintain high standards and be very selective in finding talent. It seems to be paying off — crowds have been plentiful, and most shows have sold out. Buttleman says he expects that trend to continue. His vision for the future of the amphitheater includes developing recently purchased land next door for camping or "glamping," and hosting weekend-long music festivals. "Highquality entertainment is what I try to strive for," he says.

COMMUNITY MOURNS LONGTIME PHILANTHROPIST JOY RASIN



With the passing of Joy Peterkin Rasin last spring at the age of 84, the Geneva Lake community lost an extraordinary supporter who had a hand in many

philanthropic efforts. Rasin, who split her time between Chicago, Lake Geneva and Naples, Florida, was heavily involved in Black Point Estate and Gardens, the Lake Geneva Garden Club and Horticultural Hall in Lake Geneva, as well as several nature conservancies.

David Desimone, site director at Black Point Estate, met Rasin as a member of the Black Point Horticulture Committee when he came on site in 2013. "She was a real gem of a person to work with," he says. According to Desimone, Rasin had an "expansive understanding of horticulture and landscaping." He says that though there was no designated leader of the group, Rasin often took

charge as the longest-tenured lake resident. Her legacy on the committee includes hiring an architect to execute Black Point's master site garden plan, Desimone says.

Rasin was also a longtime supporter of the Geneva Lake Water Safety Patrol. In 2020, she volunteered to host a book launch party at her home to honor the organization's 100th anniversary, for which WSP Director Ted Pankau says he is extremely grateful. According to Pankau, Rasin stressed the importance of the Water Safety Patrol's

mission. "She set a good example for other people in this community in terms of her philanthropic efforts," Pankau says.

Desimone concurs; he says Rasin's absence will be strongly felt. "She was just really such a pleasure to work with, and I enjoyed getting to know her professionally and personally."



RE-DEDICATION OF LAKE GENEVA'S RIVIERA

Almost 90 years after Lake Geneva's Riviera was first built, city leaders and business owners gathered before a crowd of about 50 people in the newly renovated ballroom to re-dedicate the building following an extensive remodeling project that took place

between December 2020 and May 2021. Lake Geneva Mayor Charlene Klein thanked those who helped accomplish the massive renovation, a project which included replacing the roof; updating and replacing the plumbing, electrical, HVAC and fire safety systems; re-envisioning the first floor arcade; and replacing the terrazzo



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floor and plaster ceiling of the upstairs ballroom, among other changes.

The building, which was built in 1932, has played host to many famous performers during its time as both a premier ballroom and, later, the Top Deck nightclub. Today the ballroom space is primarily used as a wedding and event venue, while the downstairs arcade continues to host shops and food stalls. Klein said she hopes that with the latest round of renovations, the building will be able to serve the city of Lake Geneva for many years to come.

In her remarks at the re-dedication ceremony, VISIT Lake Geneva's Executive Director Stephanie Klett summed up the building's importance to the town's identity: "Saint Louis has the Arch, New York has the Empire State Building and Lake Geneva has the Riviera."





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LAKE GENEVA'S OAK HILL CEMETERY EARNS SPOT ON NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES

Last April, following a lengthy campaign by the Lake Geneva Historic Preservation Commission, the U.S. Department of the Interior placed Lake Geneva's historic Oak Hill Cemetery on the National Register of Historic Places. Patrick Quinn, local historian and longtime member of the commission, is thrilled with the designation. "To see it finally given the recognition it deserves is very satisfying," he says.

According to Quinn, the U.S. Department of the Interior considers several factors when bestowing this designation, including a cemetery's location, the site's original landscape designer and the number of significant people who are buried there. Oak Hill Cemetery was designed by landscape architect HWS Cleveland on 40 acres of land north of downtown Lake Geneva and opened in 1880. Several important historical figures with ties to Lake Geneva are buried there, including some



of Lake Geneva's earliest settlers and 76 Union Army Civil War veterans, as well as members of prominent Chicago families with homes on Geneva Lake — including Simeon B. Chapin, R.T. Crane, Frank and Anna Buckingham Chandler and George Sturges. Additional memorials of note at Oak Hill include the final resting place of John George Moran, son of notorious gangster George C. "Bugs" Moran, and that of Dungeons


and Dragons creator Gary Gygax.

The commission is currently working to design a plaque to post in Oak Hill Cemetery recognizing its new designation as a site of historical importance. Quinn hopes that the national recognition will raise awareness about the importance of the cemetery. "It will probably become much more well-known beyond Lake Geneva than it is now."



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




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WILLIAMS BAY SAILOR TO BE INDUCTED INTO THE NATIONAL SAILING HALL OF FAME

On Oct. 16, Williams Bay resident and sailing phenomenon Jane Wiswell Pegel will be honored with induction to the National Sailing Hall of Fame (NSHOF) in Newport, Rhode Island. The Class of 2021 will be celebrated with an induction ceremony in the newly renovated Newport Armory Building,


future home of the Sailing Museum. She is one of 10 sailors to receive the honor this year.

Pegel has a long history as a top sailor not only on Geneva Lake, but nationally as well. The granddaughter of famed boatmaker John O. Johnson (founder of Johnson Boat Works in White Bear Lake, Minnesota), Pegel was born and raised in Williams Bay. She graduated Phi Beta Kappa from the University of Wisconsin–Madison in 1955, where she helped organize a competitive sailing team. Over her long sailing career, she has served as a council chair and member of the U.S. Sailing Board of Directors, director of the Geneva Lake Sailing School, as well as president of its Board of Directors.

On the water and on the ice, Pegel's sailing ability has earned her countless wins and accolades as one of the top sailors in the country. Pegel was named U.S. Sailing's Yachtswoman of the Year three times: in 1964, 1971 and 1972. She has won the Adams Cup twice, the North American Women's Championship twice, and has won championships in the X Class, C Scow, M Scow and DN iceboat classes.

Pegel's nomination to the Hall of Fame was reviewed by a selection committee comprised of representatives from the NSHOF Board, previous inductees, the sailing media, the sailing industry, the cruising community and US Sailing. She joins just eight other women who have received the recognition since it began in 2011.





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




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Looking back on a lifetime of public service, Williams Bay's David B. Williams shares his memories and his family's deep local ties

n Williams Bay, there is a title bestowed upon those people who Lomplete all their years of schooling through from kindergarten school graduation at the single-campus Williams Bay School — a "Bay Lifer." David B. Williams is one such person, but he has taken the concept of being a Bay Lifer to new heights. Now 82 years old, he has lived in Williams Bay nearly all of his life, and served as the village's municipal judge for 36 of those years. Even that impressive run is relatively short compared to his relationship with another local organization: beginning in 1957 at the age of 17, he started working for the Geneva Lake Water Safety Patrol, today headquartered on the Williams Bay campus of George Williams College of Aurora University, and began a 60+ year tenure that has earned him the title of "longest-serving patroller." On top of that, Williams is the owner of a nearly 120-year-old historic Williams Bay home that was first built by his grandfather at the turn of the 20th century.

Today Williams splits his time between Naples, Florida, and an apartment in Walworth, but Williams Bay will always be home. First things first, though: let's put a common misconception to rest. Despite having the same last name as Williams Bay's original village founder, David B. Williams and founder Israel Williams are not related, though he says people often make that assumption. In fact, David B. Williams is a scion of another family important to Williams Bay history. He is descended from a man whose name will sound familiar to local library-goers and astronomy buffs alike: Storrs B. Barrett.

EYES ON THE SKIES

According to Williams, his maternal grandfather Barrett first came to Williams Bay when he was a Ph.D. student in the department of astrophysics at the University of Chicago in the 1890s, studying under the guidance of Professor George Ellery Hale, now widely recognized as one of the greatest astronomers of the modern era. The University of Chicago as we know it today was a brand-new institution at the time – the first students matriculated on its Hyde Park campus in the fall of 1892. The University had persuaded Hale to accept the fledgling professorship by promising to build a large observatory for his department's use. According to Williams, Hale enlisted the help of a graduate student — Williams' grandfather Storrs Barrett — to identify and secure a site for the new observatory, the construction of which would be funded by Chicago transportation tycoon Charles T. Yerkes.

Together, Hale and Barrett recommended Williams Bay for its dark skies and its direct rail connection to Chicago, and construction began on Yerkes Observatory in 1895. The observatory they were building was the most cutting-edge facility in the world, and today still houses the world's largest refracting telescope, which was the best technology in the world at that time. "My grandfather realized that he would most likely be spending the entirety of his career at Yerkes Observatory, so he bought up all the [adjacent] land on Parkhurst down to Geneva Street and Constance Boulevard that was available at that time for residential development," Williams explains.

Yerkes Observatory was dedicated and opened in 1897. Five years later in 1902, Barrett and his wife Ida Clark Barrett built a home a short distance away on Parkhurst Place. According to Williams, the home's design was based upon by Ida's close friendship with Frances Kinsley Hutchinson, who together with her husband Charles Hutchinson (president of the Art Institute of Chicago), maintained an estate called Wychwood on Geneva Lake. In 1901, the Hutchinsons had hired Prairie-style architect Robert Closson Spencer, Jr., to design a gatehouse for their property, and shared the plans with the Barretts. The Barretts liked the plans so much that they built a nearly identical version of it for themselves on two acres of their land closest to the Observatory, "My grandfather built the house so that he would only have to walk five minutes to work," Williams laughs.

PUTTING DOWN ROOTS

Williams's mother Emily Barrett was born in the house in 1911, the third of three daughters born to Storrs and Ida Barrett, and it is thanks to her generational stewardship that the house has remained in Williams' family from the day it was built. Though she briefly moved away from Williams Bay to attend college and then again following her first marriage, she moved the family back to Williams Bay when Williams was around five years old. In 1952, the historic house served as the location of her second wedding when she married Williams' stepfather Mark Williams.





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Both Emily Barrett and Mark Williams shared a deep love of music — she was an accomplished musician and a graduate of the Eastman School of Music at the University of Rochester, and he was an early director of the Music by the Lake series, which began at George Williams College in 1951. It is a passion which they passed on to their son. "I am an opera nut," Williams says. "I've loved it as far back as I can remember." Famed tenor Jussi Björling has been a lifelong favorite — Williams eventually named his beloved classic wooden boat after a Björling art song titled Till Havs. (Translated from the Swedish, "till havs" means "to the sea.")

As a young man, his interests were not limited to music, in particular opera. In 1957 at the age of 17, Williams approached Williams Bay physical education teacher and coach Dick Scherff about a summer job with the Water Safety Patrol, which Scherff had recently been hired to direct. "I was younger than all the other guys at the time, and Dick Scherff didn't quite know what to do with me," Williams laughs. "So he put me on Boat #1 with him." It turned out to be a great fit. Williams went on to work nine summers on the Boat Crew of the Water Safety Patrol, through his undergraduate years at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and his time in law school at the University of Chicago. Not long after receiving his J.D., he assumed the role of legal counsel for the Water Safety Patrol, a position he held for 50 years.

A JUDICIOUS APPROACH


Following his graduation from law school in 1965, Williams joined the Delavan law firm of Richardson & Hammett (later to be renamed Hammett and Williams prior to a merger with Brennan, Steil, Basting & McDougall), where he would remain throughout his long career as an attorney in Walworth County. A few years later, he met the woman who would become his wife. "I thought she was absolutely gorgeous," he remembers. They dated casually at first but he says he knew she was the one when she agreed to attend the opera with him more than once. He and his wife Kathy were married in 1971 and went on to have two sons together.

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
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In 1978, Williams also ran for the position of judge for the newly created Municipal Court in Williams Bay. Winning the position, he found he enjoyed the role immensely. He went on to run 17 more times, and the voters of Williams Bay continued to vote for him every two years. "I think I was a good judge. I enjoyed doing it, I think I was fair," he says. "There are numerous decisions that I remember. In one case, a lady got arrested for having 23 or 24 cats in her house, and neighbors complained. The police charged her, and we had a trial. It was true that 24 cats were not technically prohibited in one home within the village limits. I found her not guilty. I felt sympathetic with her. I knew the village didn't want that many cats in one house. Somehow, in the course of her trial, I obtained information from her that she was planning to move out of the village anyhow, so I found her not guilty because the officers had written the ticket under the wrong ordinance. I gave this lady a break, knowing that she was going to move out." By the time he retired from the position in 2014, Williams had served 36 years as municipal judge, some of those alongside his friend and fellow Bay Lifer Harold Friestad, who served as village president from 1989 to 1996.

Now retired from all of his professional responsibilities, Williams says he enjoys the slower pace of life. Among his many other hobbies, besides opera, he has recently become an enthusiastic birder. In the summer and fall, he likes to take advantage of an honorary lifetime membership to the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, bestowed after his many years of membership and volunteer work as the Principal Race Officer for sailing races and regattas there. In fact, he is now one of the longest-serving members of the club.

Since his wife Kathy passed away in November 2020, Williams has downsized and opted to rent out the family home in Williams Bay. He hopes that one day he may be able to pass its legacy on to another generation of Barrett descendants — he is a proud grandfather of three, and he hopes that one day his grandson Storrs may get to experience life in Williams Bay as he and his children have. "It's just a great place to grow up and live," he says. "I've got great memories."









Looking back on the Great Chicago
Fire 150 years later and its effect on
the Lake Geneva of today

n the night of Oct. 9, 1871, Ada Rumsey (daughter of former Chicago mayor Julian Rumsey) stood alongside her mother as she watched red-hot flames reach toward her childhood home on Chicago's Huron Street. The fire would soon engulf the entire property, and the Rumsey family would be forced to flee. Carrying only a few valuables — family portraits, heirloom silver, insurance papers — they eventually made their way to the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad station. With the fire still raging, the destination was clear: Lake Geneva.

The Rumsey family was one of many who made their way to Lake Geneva in the aftermath of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Lake Geneva extension of the Chicago & Northwestern train line had been completed

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only a few months earlier. For families with financial means, the Wisconsin lake town became the perfect place to wait out the worst of the fire's damage. Many of those families would go on to establish summer residences around the lake. Today, 150 years later, the influence these wealthy "resorters" exerted on the Lake Geneva area in the aftermath of the fire lingers still, from the opulent lake homes they inspired, to the charitable organizations they founded, to the area's continued status as one of the premier resort towns in the Midwest.

A CITY ON FIRE

The Great Chicago Fire raged for three days from Oct. 8-11, 1871. It had been a hot, dry summer — Chicago received only 1.5 inches of rain from July to October. These conditions, coupled with high winds, created the perfect environment for the powerful fire, in a city made almost entirely of wooden buildings. The fire eventually become so powerful that it leapt the Chicago River not once, but twice, destroying any hope Chicagoans had of protecting the city.

As Ada Rumsey recalled in her memoir:

"The sky kept getting redder and redder; the wind, already high, was increasing with the heat, and huge burning cinders were settling in every direction... refugees loaded with goods were going north by our house; and altogether the circumstances were terrifying."

As the fire continued to move from the south to the north side, more and more families were forced to evacuate their homes. When the fire finally burned itself out on the third day, the stunned city took stock of what was left: fire had killed more than 300 people, damaged 2,000 acres of property and left one-third of Chicagoans without homes. The final tally of destruction: roughly 17,000 buildings and an estimated \$200 million lost. To many, amid all of this chaos, Lake Geneva stood like a beacon of hope.

A SAFE HAVEN

At the time of the Chicago Fire, there was just one summer estate on the lake — Maple Lawn, belonging to Chicagoan Shelton Sturges, heir to a large grain elevator fortune. He had purchased the





















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





Montague Farm in 1870 and transformed the modest property, building a mansion with extensive grounds. Following its completion, Sturges made it his life's mission to recruit friends and family to join him at the lake.

In the summer of 1871, just prior to the fire, Sturges had moved his family into the main house at Maple Lawn, while his brother Buckingham took over the property's original Montague farmhouse. Their brother George and George's Chicago neighbor, Julian Rumsey, rented rooms at a boarding house in town. Thus, the very first "society season" at the lake included the Sturges and Rumsey families.

The Rumseys had only been back in the city for a few weeks when the fire destroyed their home, so it is no surprise that they viewed Lake Geneva as their logical refuge. According to Ada's memoirs, they arrived with no change of clothing, so the townspeople sewed them new clothes. The next year, the Rumseys began building their own Lake Geneva summer estate, called Shadow Hill, which they completed even before they rebuilt their Chicago home.










The Geneva Lake that greeted these refugees from the Chicago Fire was not yet an elite summer destination. It was an undeveloped, forested, pristine lake more suited to rustic camping, with a small village on the east end of the lake, a group of houses near Williams Bay and another small settlement at the lake's west end. A little more than three decades earlier, after



the U.S. government removed the Potawatomi Indians in 1836, the first white settlers had begun to arrive in the area — mostly tradesmen and farmers. By 1838, the tiny Village of Geneva boasted two small hotels. In 1844, the village was officially incorporated and a decade later, the first newspaper was published.


Throughout the 1850s, the new settlers continued to build homes, schools and churches. However, the shoreline of the lake remained mostly undeveloped; farmers were more interested in flat, tillable land. As Mary Burns Gage and Ann Wolfmeyer have suggested in their book "Newport of the West," the lakeshore in 1870 presented a quiet scene: "mile after mile of dense woods broken only by a small cluster of homes marking Williams Bay, and the village of Geneva... with a population of barely over 1,000."

There were no paved roads around the lake, only a small number of buildings on the shoreline and few tourists, though a handful of intrepid campers made the trek to the lake for swimming, fishing and relaxation, a trend that would only increase in the years following the fire.



CAMPS BEFORE COUNTRY CLUBS

It's important to note that despite his relatively early arrival, Sturges did not discover a lake entirely devoid of tourists. Before the millionaires arrived, Geneva Lake played host to an active camp scene. As early as the 1860s, numerous groups began traveling to Geneva Lake to camp and fish. Finding they enjoyed their summer nights spent on the shores of the lake in tents, these groups began buying plots of land to establish more





permanent campgrounds. Early examples include Camp Collie (now Conference Point Camp), the Lakeside Park Club of Elgin (now Elgin Club), Belvidere Camp (now Belvidere Park) and Harvard Camp (now Harvard Club).

These communities began as sites for modest tent camping — initially no one was looking to build an expensive summer

home. Even the relatively glamorous Buena Vista community in Fontana (which at one point contained two elaborate fountains) began in 1875 as a rugged campsite called Porter's Park. At Elgin Club, a small group of fishermen



happily spent their summer nights camping in tents until 1874, when they replaced their tents with cottages around a central dining house, a practice that was repeated at many of the camps over the years.











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

Even the large and well-known 19th century resort Kaye's Park (now the South Shore Club) began in 1873 as a campground. Originally the site held one cottage for proprietor Arthur Kaye and his family, and tents for the guests. Over the next two decades, Kaye would transform the property into a glamorous resort with multiple lodging options, an elegant dining room, a racetrack, zoo and museum.

FAMOUS VISITORS

It's hard to say exactly what changed the farming and camping community of Lake Geneva into a luxurious resort town. Was it the completion of the train line, bringing countless visitors from Chicago? Was it the Great Chicago Fire, which sent both rich and poor in search of lodgings, first temporary and then more permanent? Or was it Shelton Sturges, the first millionaire to build a mansion at the lake? It was likely a combination of all three — with a bit of help from celebrity visits.

In May 1872, the Lake Geneva Herald reported, "Our hotels receive guests almost every day and our streets are made more lively and agreeable by the presence of constantly increasing

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numbers of Chicago friends." It was the summer after the Chicago Fire, and many visitors returned to the lake for fresh air and a change of scenery. In August, former First Lady Mary Todd Lincoln stayed at Colton's Exchange, a Lake Geneva hotel, adding to the air of excitement.

The following summer saw a visit from another Civil War-era icon: General Philip Sheridan. He had taken command of Chicago in the weeks after the Great Fire, overseeing a period of martial law. Because of this, he achieved a level of local celebrity that made both tourists and locals excited to meet him. During his visit, Sheridan stayed in the private home of Dr. Philip Maxwell (today the Maxwell Mansion) and viewed a regatta held in his honor by the Lake Geneva Yacht Club. The Sheridan Cup race is still held annually.

THE "SARATOGA OF THE WEST"


Not far from Dr. Maxwell's private home, the Whiting House Hotel opened its doors in 1873, offering the first luxury hotel accommodations at Geneva Lake. (The site today contains the


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




Geneva Towers condominiums.) David T. Whiting built the 60-room hotel to "accommodate Chicago's finest guests," and it offered stunning lake views as well as a world-class ballroom. Beginning in 1875, visitors to the area would have seen the first *Lady of the Lake*, a double-decker steamer capable of carrying 200 passengers, docked not far from the Whiting House Hotel.

On rides aboard the Lady of the Lake, visitors would have enjoyed gossiping about the new mansions springing up on the shoreline. Following the Chicago Fire, several wealthy Chicagoans built estates around the lake, following in Sturges' lead. The Rumsey family was one of them. Other early lakefront property owners included Allen C. Calkins, a former Chicago alderman who built a 10-room cottage called Oak Lodge on Geneva Bay in 1873, N.K. Fairbank who built Buttnernuts in 1874 (and then rebuilt it the following year after it burned to the ground), and George L. Dunlap, who built the Moorings on the site of today's Stone Manor in 1875.

In August 1875, a "special correspondent" for the Chicago Tribune







wrote an article on the transformation of Lake Geneva. The article described how "a staid, quiet little village has already been metamorphosed into a metropolitan resort." The correspondent named the Sturges family as "pioneers" of this change and further dubbed Lake Geneva the "Saratoga of the West" after the popular resort town in upstate New York. Later, Lake Geneva would earn the nickname "Newport of the West," in reference to the East Coast's most elite summer resort area.

A TOWN TRANSFORMED

On April 29, 1874, Rumsey met with Calkins, Fairbank and Dunlap at the Whiting House Hotel to establish the Geneva Lake Yacht Club. They created the club's bylaws, set rules for boat races and elected Fairbank the club's first commodore. Here were some of Chicago's top businessmen and political leaders, gathered at the newly built Lake Geneva hotel to determine how best to race their new yachts. This meeting, in many ways, marked the moment that the area transformed from a small farming community into a luxury resort, a transformation which had its beginnings in a massive conflagration.

Looking out at the flames approaching her home in 1871, Ada Rumsey could have had no way of envisioning the impact the devastating fire would have on the rural Wisconsin lake town where her family had just spent a relaxing summer. But in the aftermath of the tragedy, her family's decision to make Lake Geneva their summer home, a decision echoed by many of the elite families of Chicago, would ultimately mold the area into the world-class resort town it remains to this day.





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

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A Lake Geneva home displays dazzling lighting features and warm, wood accents

For homeowners Phil Johnson and his wife, Emily Soley-Johnson, the first glimmers of what would become their Lake Geneva dream home started with an impulse buy intended to while away a long flight. "We bought an architecture magazine at the airport one year when flying out of Chicago," Johnson says. "We spotted a modern farmhouse style we loved. This was just before the style became so popular." Johnson, an electrical contractor and owner of Lake Geneva's Foremost Electric, has worked on many of the area's most luxurious homes, so when the couple found the architectural style they liked, they had plenty of ideas about how to turn their dream into reality.

They broke ground on the house in 2018, just three years after the fateful magazine purchase, and moved into the home in January of 2019. Nestled on South Lake Shore Drive just north of downtown




Lake Geneva, the 3,600-square-foot home boasts three bedrooms and two-and-a-half baths, with an option to finish the basement for additional guest space in the future. The Johnsons designed the home to live in with their two daughters — 6-year-old Hazel and 3-year-old Ruby.

LIGHTING THE WAY FORWARD

The Johnsons' home is full of personalized details. It's a year-round oasis of glowing light, from the multiple gas and electric fireplaces to the backlit built-ins to the stylish light fixtures. A lighting scheme of this magnitude requires a wise, professional eye, which makes perfect sense here given Johnson's profession. And he didn't just install all of those lights — he also served as the general contractor on the project. "I wanted to be part of each step of the building process," he explains. "We had a vision for every square foot of this house, and by leading the process, the final product feels so fulfilling."

Although Johnson admits that he didn't have a great deal of building experience











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




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prior to serving as the GC for his home build project, he says he had picked up knowledge from "being in the trades" and "being around it for years." According to Johnson, it helped that everyone they hired for the building process were "tradesmen we knew and trusted."

MODERN DESIGN, WARM FINISHES

The home features an open floor plan, a perfect choice for an active and busy family like the Johnsons. "We like to have space for guests and children to spread out," he says. "We found that most times, everyone congregates around the kitchen, so we just expanded that space to flow through our main area." Because of this, they designed the living room to flow seamlessly into the kitchen, allowing for sizeable gatherings. The spaces are tied together with thoughtful design choices, like the rich walnut flooring throughout and the wood ceiling accents. Even the bedrooms and utilitarian spaces like the office and mud room also feel open and spacious due to the high ceilings and exceptional lighting.

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
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Warm wood accents are a theme throughout the house, from the flooring and railings to the ceilings, beams and even some countertops. "[My wife and I] both grew up in northern Minnesota and love the warm feel of the woods," Johnson explains. The floors throughout the home are walnut, special-ordered to include "extra sap," which provides the unique look of lighter wood mixed with the walnut's natural dark hues. "We also carried the walnut into the ceiling, beamwork and fireplace surrounds throughout our house for additional character," he adds.

PERSONALIZED TOUCHES THROUGHOUT

Another large part of the inspiration for the home came from their surroundings and Johnson's experience as an electrical contractor. "We definitely have some Lake Geneva inspiration," Johnson says. "Being an electrical contractor in the area has allowed me to be part of so many beautiful lake homes. With this opportunity, I have seen many creative and new ideas over the years to draw inspiration from." Johnson says it wasn't

difficult to arrive at their final design choices since they'd long had "a clear picture for every detail," spending several years dreaming and planning.

For the Johnsons, part of this vision included showing off their personalities and tastes — they even dedicated space in the home to their shared love of wine. As self-described wine enthusiasts, Johnson says that this space was a must-have. "Not only do we have the beautiful wine storage cabinet, but we have the area by the three-sided fireplace to sit and enjoy a glass [of wine] with friends and family."

The warmth shared by this family is evident throughout the house, aided by the perfect lighting in every room. In fact, according to Johnson, it was the lighting that "really finished the home," a project that was a labor of love from start to finish. "In the end, we'll enjoy our efforts for many years," he says. "Every day, I look around and think about how lucky I am to live in this great community."

How to Get the Jook

As the owner of Foremost Electric, Johnson emphasized impressive electrical features throughout his home. To capture these well-lit looks, Johnson shares his tips and tricks.

GLOWING STAIRS

Johnson says, "The lights on the stairs are one of my favorite lighting features in the home. This detail was achieved through LED ribbons being installed in a diffused channel on the overhang of the treads. We had many hours of prepping wires and planning with our stair builder."

LIT-UP KITCHEN CABINETS

"Kitchens need a lot of light, and accent lighting adds to the look," Johnson notes. "The under-cabinet LED lights add great task lighting, while the upper cabinet puck lights showcase display items."

PRIMARY BEDROOM FIREPLACE

As a new product on the market, Johnson immediately loved this modern fireplace. To capture this cozy yet current feel in your own home, skip the gas and instead, turn to a fully electric fireplace that uses water to make steam, creating a realistic smoke effect.

ILLUMINATED SHOWER SHELVES

Johnson installed waterproof LED ribbon in the soap niches in both showers, which ties in nicely with the bathroom vanity toe-kick lighting.



Local microbreweries offer a wide array of flavors and stories STORY BY MARY BERGIN | PHOTOGRAPHY BY HOLLY LEITNER hen done right, properly fermented beer produced in small batches goes beyond quenching the thirst. It piques the imagination, expands the palate and evokes a sense of place, too. In the area's microbreweries, the flavor is truly local — from the beer recipes' backstories to the unique character of the brewpubs themselves. The popularity of microbreweries has grown quickly in southeastern Wisconsin and northern Illinois, and behind each new brew is a unique story. While it's true that all beer contains grain, hops, yeast and water, what happens from there is a mix of skill,

patience and ingenuity, often in a setting that encourages visitors to linger over a pint and return for more.


Beer names might be both playful and pertinent, enhanced with artistic label designs. Brewmasters might be self-taught or educated internationally (or a combination of the

two). Taprooms are located anywhere beer lovers can find them — on farms or in downtowns, in strip malls or even industrial parks. At microbreweries, it's the beer that is paramount, but some taprooms also offer snacks, a meal menu or live music to add to the experience.

TOPSY TURVY BREWERY, LAKE GENEVA

Dan Schuld of Topsy Turvy Brewery in downtown Lake Geneva balances fun with reverence for his microbrewery's location: a century-old, Neo Gothic, former Baptist church that features the original stained-glass windows. Depending on the month, brewmaster Justin Kirsch's 20 on-tap choices might include Sweet Jesus Zachi Stout (made with Ecuadorian chocolate) or Sinful Holy Water (a deep cherry seltzer).

"Justin approaches his work like an artist designing a stained-glass



window," Schuld says of his colleague's brewing. "We craft our beer in small, precise batches with the finest ingredients." Kirsch started as a home brewer before working at Chicagoland breweries and taking brewing classes in Belgium, eventually finding his way to Lake Geneva.

Why call the Lake Geneva endeavor Topsy Turvy? "It's a 16th century expression and literally means upside down," Schuld says. "That's our philosophy: We are rooted in experimentation and pushing the boundaries." As part of this philosophy, they develop new versions of beer weekly.





Look for brews (and their Dive line of hard seltzers) named after "local inventions, historical sites and tourist attractions." Examples: Blonde ales Geneva Beach and Lake Path, and New England IPA Mailboat Hopper.

DUESTERBECK'S BREWING COMPANY, ELKHORN

Rare is the microbrewery that is based on a Wisconsin farm. Near Elkhorn, on a fifth-generation family farm, is Duesterbeck's Brewing Company, open since 2019 in a gorgeously renovated red barn on the property.

"With the farm buildings deteriorating, we needed to redefine our terms of agriculture," explains Laura Johnson, who co-owns Duesterbeck's with her brewmaster husband Ben (he holds degrees in bacteriology and dentistry as well). In addition to the taproom/bar space, the family added a roomy outdoor patio, an outdoor stage for live music and an additional outdoor bar, completely



rebuilding a former pig barn to use for events and additional outdoor seating.

"Ben's specialty as a brewer is making such a wide variety of styles that there is always something for everyone," Laura says. Their most popular beer? That's a toss-up between Crop Duester (a cream ale) and Nutty Bill's Peanut Butter Porter.

KISHWAUKEE BREWING COMPANY, WOODSTOCK, ILL.

Just across the state line in Woodstock, Illinois is the edgy, industrial vibe of Kishwaukee Brewing Company. Owner Dan Payson is an architect who began brewing beer professionally during the Great Recession of 2008.

Brewery construction began "on the day before the country shut down" due to COVID-19 in spring 2020. A few months later, the 10,000-square-foot building that fills much of an industrial park field opened for business. Next to the brewhouse, the property boasts an outdoor beer garden, the site of







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creative events like a Monday night yoga class that includes a pint of beer. Sometimes food trucks sell tacos, burgers, pastries or pasta, the perfect complements to Kishwaukee's popular beers.

Less than one mile away is "The Kish" — the Kishwaukee River, a migration point for sandhill cranes and other regional birds. Payson is sensitive to the environmental impact of his work: the spent grain from the brewing process goes to local farms, where it is used to feed cattle and poultry. His asymmetrical design of the brewhouse roof will make it easier to add solar panels, a goal for the future.

And the beer? "We brew traditional beers, made as close to style as possible," Payson says. Don't expect flashy names: Lager, Pilsner, Gose (a sour German brew) and Marzen (a seasonal Bavarian lager) are among the choices.

"I call it what it is," Payson says. Each beer bottle label features a crisp work of art that acknowledges local flora and fauna. "We want this to be a destination," Payson says of his brewery. "It's quiet, off the beaten path, a place to take a deep breath and relax."

HOLZLAGER BREWING COMPANY, WOODSTOCK, ILL.

Experimentation is key at another Woodstock craft brewery, Holzlager Brewing Company, where three friends — all engineers — took over a former hardware store in a strip mall and gave it a new purpose in 2019. The vibe is fun and intense: Anchoring the company logo is an owl with piercing eyes and antlers.

The flagship beer is Clown Hammer, an IPA that was one of the first products the trio sold. According to co-owner Mario Cortez, El Heffe is their riff on a Mexican dark lager, served with a zesty Mexican Bloody Mary mix, made locally.

Customers bring their own food or munch on Champion Pizza (locals' favorite) or Craft Beer Jerky (beef jerky marinated with craft beer). Last summer, the brewery began experimenting with





hard seltzers. Normally, traditional seltzers are clear, but not here: A new blueberry seltzer was deliberately made an eyecatching purple. Another flavor they're working on, inspired by county fairs, is cotton candy.

Good news for homebodies: a recent addition of canning equipment means Holzlager beer is easier to find at grocery stores in northern Illinois and southeastern Wisconsin.

SECOND SALEM BREWING COMPANY, WHITEWATER

In Whitewater, Second Salem Brewing Company offers a small, artisanal approach to microbrewing. Brewmaster Christ Christon (he's also a jiu jistu teacher and volunteer firefighter) explains it is technically a nanobrewery,



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
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producing one barrel of beer at a time.

Second Salem sets itself apart from many microbreweries by presenting a casual but robust food menu in addition to its beer, served on a patio overlooking Cravath Lake. Many of the menu items are rooted in local lore about witches. hauntings, mythical creatures and spooky events. One example is the Witch Hunter burger, dressed with gouda, bacon, greens, tomatoes, red onion, roasted red pepper and minced garlic.

Award-winning beers include Beast of Bray, an amber ale named after an Elkhorn road of the same name where a werewolf-like creature was allegedly spotted in the 1990s. On one wall of the taproom is an artist's rendition of the mythical beast. Other beer names and labels play up Whitewater's spookier side: Bone Orchard, an IPA; The Reaper, a pale wheat; and Witchtower Pale Ale.






EAST TROY BREWERY, **EAST TROY**

East Troy Brewery, located on East Troy's village square, has been brewing since 2018, when Ann and Ted Zess converted an historic bank building into a brewpub. The project helped





to reinvigorate the community while preserving East Troy's history. That focus on the community extends to the beer itself: Brewmaster Shay Leamon has apprenticed with some of the best-trained brewmasters in Wisconsin and says she tries to use local and regional ingredients in her beers, including Wisconsin-grown malts, hops from providers including the Wisconsin Hop Exchange and Breiss in Chilton, Wisconsin and locally grown, organic corn.

East Troy Brewery chef Ashley Turner makes everything on the extensive menu from scratch, working with local farmers to source key ingredients for her dishes. Visitors enjoy a rotating assortment of beers on tap to pair with menu items like sweet chile pork tacos, white truffle pear pizza, and burrata with smoked peach and tomato salad. And the beers people can't seem to get enough of? Leamon says three popular options are the Hippie Dippie Organic Golden Ale, Because... Dinosaurs Hazy IPA and Helles of Troy, a crisp lager.

THE HIVE TAPROOM, EAST TROY

Just outside of downtown East Troy is The Hive Taproom, where owners Tim and Ayla Guild specialize in brewing their own session mead. What is mead? Technically it is a honey wine, but it's






East Troy offers two microbrewery options: East Troy Brewery (above) and The Hive Taproom, a meadery (below).







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brewed like beer and tastes more like a cider or a champagne. Husband-and-wife team Tim (the brewer) and Ayla (the beekeeper) were inspired to open The Hive when they noticed a need for a high-quality, gluten-free beverage experience in the area.

The Hive Taproom combines the energy of a fun, laid-back craft brewery and the comforts of a winery. Visitors often stop by with kids and pets in tow, ready to choose from 14 different meads on tap, as well as house-made soda and a hopped honey kombucha on tap. Food options include snacks and small plates — gluten-free flatbreads sourced from Cranky Al's in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin are a favorite. For mead connoisseurs, there's a quarterly membership program that comes with a one-of-a-kind honey tumbler and an invitation to the Members' Night mixer.



Feeling stressed-out and stuck? Life coaching could boost your physical, emotional and mental wellness and lead you down a new path.

IT'S A FACT: life can get downright tricky. Almost universally, life became more stressful during the pandemic, which has left people reeling in its wake. For many, this past year has inspired a reevaluating of life choices. Do I want to return to the office or quit my job? Am I really happy in this marriage? How can I make a more positive impact in the world?

Luckily, there are experts called life coaches who specialize in guiding individuals through difficult decisions just like these. But what is life coaching? And can it benefit you?

WHAT IS LIFE COACHING?

Life coaching is a customized, personal experience which will vary by coach as well as client, with no two sessions being exactly the same. Lake Geneva's Katey Collins, whose business is Tri Life Coach, says that life coaching is like having your own personal mentor, cheerleader and teacher who holds you accountable to your goals.

Megan Colleen Johnson, a life coach and self-reclamation guide also based in Lake Geneva, expands on that. "Life coaching is a broad title for wellness practitioners who are trained to support folks as they self-actualize, move toward their goals and ultimately thrive," she says. She notes that generally, coaches want to empower their clients to discover their own answers through "powerful questioning" and "talk modalities."

While there are many life coaches who have completed a certification program, this is not required by law. However, for best results, it does matter that they've undergone training or apprenticed with

another life coach. You can look on a coach's website or ask a prospective coach about the training they've completed.

"I believe training is imperative," Johnson says. "You can quickly tell whether a life coach has training or not through booking a consultation with them and watching for these key indicators — do they guide the conversation well? Can they clearly articulate how they will support you? When asked, do they have certifications and mentorship experience that will be helpful when coaching you specifically? Do they listen and truly hear what you are saying?"

WHAT DOES THE PROCESS LOOK LIKE?

The life-coaching process varies from coach to coach. When Johnson works with clients, she begins by helping the client set a goal. Sometimes this goal can be general: "I want to wake up feeling fully alive each morning," or, "I want to be the most confident I've ever been." In other cases, the client may have one

specific goal or a set of two to three goals to work toward.

Johnson speaks with her clients regularly over a period of several months. "During each session, we discuss what is going well, where they are feeling stuck and, utilizing coaching techniques, we navigate those sticky spaces together," she says. "As we work through the sticky spaces, a session can hold major 'aha' moments where the client experiences a breakthrough in what they thought was possible or how they view the world."

Similarly, Collins supports her clients in a variety of ways throughout a six-month program. This includes hour-long weekly sessions in her office; outdoor sessions walking along the lakeshore path, virtual "Zoom" meetings; or phone calls. Collins also has a Facebook group in which her clients encourage one another, and she offers local events. She points out that many circumstances inspire people to seek out life coaching — they may be contemplating career transitions, or trying to improve their physical and/or mental health. They may need help with navigating complicated relationships or want to learn better communication strategies and overcome mindset barriers.

It's important to recognize that life coaching differs from traditional therapy. "Life coaches will not provide a mental health diagnosis for clients," Collins says. "They do not bill insurance companies or treat trauma from a therapeutic level."

In some cases, a life coach may determine that a traditional therapist is a better fit for that client. "If a client is depressed or stuck in a way that seems unaffected by working through common blocks, I refer them to a therapist," Ford explains.

Katie, a client of Johnson's, sought out coaching when she felt that "there was more out there." She says she greatly benefited from coaching. "I think we so often get stuck in spots and feel like we have to stay there. If we can't fix a sink, we don't just think, 'Eh, it'll be stuck like this forever.' No, you either learn the skills to fix the sink or hire someone who can fix it so you can keep on using it,"

she explains. "I was able to learn so many tools to help me problem-solve sticky situations."

WHAT ARE THE POTENTIAL BENEFITS?

Collins describes life coaching as a process and a journey. She points out that individual results vary depending on the length of time working with a coach and the amount of work put in.

If you'd like to experience mental-health benefits, for example, you might participate in daily practices that are suggested by your life coach, such as writing, meditation, intentional breathing techniques and more. "Building these habits in a coaching relationship helps them [the habits] become the norm," Ford says.

Johnson's client Katie says she has reaped many benefits from life coaching. She says that in addition to improving her work-life balance and further developing her creativity, she was able to rise as her most confident and empowered self. my voice, deeply rooting myself in my values, while growing," she says. And the self-improvement didn't just stop there. Katie says that in every way, her entire circle has benefited from her life-coaching experience, whether directly or indirectly. "Not just me personally, but my husband, my daughters, my family, my co-workers, my students, my ministry — I could go on and on."

CAN IT HELP YOU?

According to the coaches, you'll likely be a great fit for life coaching if you answer yes to these questions:

• Do you have a specific desire or goal you wish to achieve?

- Do you have the drive to work toward it?
- Have you been trying to make changes without success?
- Are you willing to examine your habits, routines, beliefs and lifestyle?
- Are you open to new strategies and skills?

If these questions stir your soul, life coaching could provide the direction needed to begin your journey of self-improvement. "Life coaching can profoundly impact one's mental health, physical health and relationships," Johnson says. "It's about giving yourself permission to be the human you desire to be in the world, and helping you get there."

The Phoenix Park Bandshell is a musical gathering spot for Delavan and beyond BY AMANDA N. WEGNER



elavan's Phoenix Park Bandshell is celebrating 15 years of offering free music to area residents, but the history of this beloved bandshell goes back further than that. Much, much further.

"Our bandshell has had quite the history," says Al Buchholz, vice president of the Friends of the Phoenix Park Bandshell.

"Now it's a cherished part of the community that has regrown from humble beginnings."

DELAVAN'S EARLIEST DAYS

In 1838, shortly after the first white settlers arrived in Walworth County, Delavan founders Col. Samuel F.

and brother Henry Phoenix donated a 3.28-acre parcel of land to what was then the small village. In addition to the land donation, the brothers also gifted the four adjacent sides of the parcel, which were designated for use by houses of worship; at one time, the park was surrounded by Episcopalian, Methodist, United Church of Christ and Baptist churches. After Delavan's first public school was built on one side of the park in 1845, locals began calling it School Park.

Around 1870, the village paid \$175 to Charles Blair to build a gazebo-style bandshell at the north-central end of the park, the perfect spot to host Delavan's city band as well as numerous community events, concerts and meetings. Perhaps the most famous person to speak from its stage was William Jennings Bryan, three-time Democratic presidential candidate and Secretary of State under President Woodrow Wilson. Bryan made several trips to the area in the early 20th century and spoke before a crowd of 1,500 people at the Delavan Bandshell in July of 1921, just a few years before his death.

Despite attracting national speakers, the bandshell suffered from damage, disrepair and vandalism over the next few decades. In 1926, pranksters set off a charge of dynamite under the building, badly damaging the structure. For the next 20 years, it would continue to stand as a dilapidated backdrop to the park.

In 1930, city leaders rededicated and renamed it Phoenix Park, in honor of the town's founders. Despite the eyesore that the bandshell had become, the park itself continued to thrive, hosting picnics, public events and programs. In the 1930s and 1940s, Phoenix Park became a haven for ice skating in the winter, and with funding received from the Works

Progress Administration in 1935, shuffleboard and tennis courts were added. By contrast, the bandshell was falling down, so in 1948, the city razed the structure on a cold day in mid-December. "It was so damaged and vandalized," says Buchholz. "It had to go. And that spot sat empty for nearly 50 years."




In the mid-1990s, public interest in a new bandshell at Phoenix Park was revived when park neighbors began advocating for a revitalization of the area. "There were a couple visionaries who wanted to do something different with the park; it had become underutilized," says Buchholz. "Then it was a matter of putting heads together — what can we do to make better use of the space and be better for the community?"

He adds that some city officials were aware of the park's history. "There was a thought that maybe we can do something similar [to what was done in the past] and be successful again," he says. "So far, that seems to be the case." Through those (sometimes heated) discussions between the neighbors and the city, the new bandshell was completed in 2007, a unique wood-sided, timber-frame structure that is a monument to Delavan's history as well as a beloved community gathering spot for a new generation.

A HUB FOR ENTERTAINMENT

Shortly after the new bandshell was built in 2007, a nonprofit organization called the Friends of the Phoenix Park Bandshell formed to assume the task of filling the bandshell's music calendar. This group of volunteers works diligently to provide the community with a wide variety of free, high-quality musical performances across an array of genres throughout the summer season. "It gives us, as a community, a place to gather and enjoy music," says Buchholz. "We've grown from humble beginnings in the first few years to really something really amazing."

In past years, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Phoenix Park Bandshell



hosted 25 to 40 concerts per year, providing free music to more than 16,000 people. In the summer of 2021, nearly 10,000 guests had enjoyed concerts at the bandshell by the Fourth of July, says Buchholz, which shows how hungry people are for live music and a sense of community.

"To me, it's a little hidden gem," adds Mel Davis, the organization's volunteer coordinator. "More and more people know about it now. It's growing and getting bigger, because it offers such a great musical experience and atmosphere. You might go to another community and pay a charge to see the same band you can see here for free. It's incredible."

This focus on music also connects to interesting area history. In the 1930s and 1940s, Delavan was once a ballroom mecca, with multiple ballrooms hosting Big Bands for dancing, led by bandleader legends like Lawrence Welk. "There is a musical history we are contributing to with this," says Buchholz. "Historically, Delavan is very artistic and very musical. We're just trying to keep that going as best we can."



To help keep that tradition alive, a dance floor was added in front of the bandshell about 10 years ago, which allows people to not only listen to the music but get up and dance.

The group also works with other organizations in town to promote cultural events and to help increase tourism to Delavan. Additional events at the bandshell and the park include dance groups, car shows, heritage festivals and more.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Now in its 15th year, what makes the

Friends of the Phoenix Park Bandshell organization successful and allows the bandshell to thrive is the support it receives from the community. The organization is completely run by volunteers, and covers its operational costs through sponsorships, concession sales and donations. "It's supported by everyone in town and is a family-oriented deal," says Buchholz. "It's a great place where everyone gathers and gets together, enjoys the wonderful summer weather, and becomes a part of a community event that they can feel very comfortable at." Adds Davis: "When you



go to the bandshell and see [everyone from] seniors to small children, that shows the sense of community and purpose we have in our city and that this place brings."

The word is getting out, and visitors from beyond Delavan are now flocking to the bandshell as well. "It is successful beyond what I had visioned, and I'm ever so grateful for the support of the people," says Buchholz. "Apparently, they like it, because they open their pocketbooks to help and are attending and bringing friends and neighbors. I'm happy other communities are looking at it and seeing the success. The bigger we make the pie, the more everyone shares. The more, the merrier."

Davis believes that the park will only get better in the coming years thanks to ongoing support from the city. "The city is invested in improving Phoenix Park, which is an awesome park to begin with," he explains. "They see how successful this is, and what it does for the community. It's already amazing, and it's only going to get better."
